


#### **Dear R-P Community:**

Like all other travel plans, without knowing where we want to go, creating details on how to arrive are meaningless. Strategic planning defines the "where" that our school district is heading.

In strategic planning, it is also essential to benchmark progress or movement. In this article, I'd like to highlight several important, meaningful, and impactful initiatives that have been implemented or improved over the past



#### Goal #1: 100% of Rocket Graduates are College and Career Aware and Ready – Initiatives:

- 23 Initiative The awareness and building of a culture that adopts, accepts, and works toward high educational standards for all kids.
- Summer and early reading campaign Creating the awareness of the research behind the powerful benefits of reading early and reading often.
- Rockets on Campus An initiative to put "boots on the ground" at campuses all over Michigan. Three hundred 6th graders spent one or more days on a college campus during the 2013-2014 school year.
- ACT and GPA requirements for all colleges and universities in Michigan prominently displayed in all buildings.
- Significant increase in the breadth and depth of the Career Speakers Forum at RPHS with a heightened emphasis on Rocket alumni who've been successful in their chosen careers.
- A formal mentoring program initiated at the high school for freshmen students who are/were struggling.

#### Goal #2: No Boundaries, No Limits: Anytime, Anyplace, Any Level Learning for All – Initiatives:

- One of the first districts to fully implement the Common Core with a particular emphasis on teaching problem solving skills.
- · Summer reading and reward initiative.
- · Additional online course options through Michigan Virtual University.
- Increase in blended courses, Advanced Placement enrollment, dual enrollment, and early college enrollment.
- Significant increase in the offering of pre-kindergarten education from two sections of GSRP (Great Start Readiness Programs) to 11 sections.
- Increase in place based and environmental teaching strategies.

#### Goal #3: On Demand, Continuous, and Personalized Communication – Initiatives:

- Creation of the concept of Rocket City to put a geographic identity with an exemplary school system.
- Hosting the inaugural Rocket City Games day to increase awareness of R-P opportunities and pride.
- Increase in school to home communication through Facebook, Twitter, blogs, e-mail listservs, and electronic newsletters.
- Significant increase in parental involvement in PTO groups and most booster groups.
- Implementation of K-4 standards based report cards to give a more in-depth perspective to parents relative to student growth and achievement.

#### Goal #4: 100% Plugged In: Every Child Connected to an Out of School, Coordinated, Value Added Activity – Initiatives:

- Implementation of a Rocket City Traveler and Summer Reading Challenge initiative.
- Significant increase in the coordination of athletic and extra-curricular activities from the high school through the youth programs.
- Links Program to connect students with autism to peer buddies and mentors at Central Elementary.
- Stinky Shoe Award for the greatest school level participation in the Seaway Run.
- Fun and creative methods for getting students active and inspired such as Run the Spruce with Dr. Seuss.

#### Goal #5: Green and Clean: Environmentally and Economically Independent – Initiatives:

- We have now exceeded \$2 million in savings since the inception of our Energy Management and Conservation Program.
- Three schools now identified as Michigan Green Schools for their energy and environmental stewardship.
- Doubling of the number of community gardens in the school district.
- Piloting of a "green roof" at R-PEL.
- Decrease in the amount of paper communication; replaced by electronic communication.
- Host of Muskegon County Earth Fair.
- Passing of a balanced budget for the 2014-2015 school year.
- Significant increase in recycling and composting at most school buildings.
- Focused and intentional allocation of budget to meet student needs.

Here's to continuing the progress already begun to make R-P Schools the best place to learn, contribute, and compete.

Peer to Peer is here!!! Central Elementary has recently implemented an evidence-based practice program to help its students with Autism Spectrum Disorders (ASD). R-P Links, a Peer to Peer program, pairs students with ASD (target students) with peers to help them academically and socially. Links (peers

assisting those students with ASD) had to fill out an application and get parent permission in order to be considered for a Links. Once the Links were chosen, they attended a week long, very intensive training where they learned what ASD is and how to positively support students with ASD. Since January, R-P Links has successfully "linked" three target students with Links to assist them in the classroom, at lunch, out for recess and on the bus.

Teachers of the target students have commented on the benefits of the program. Not only do the target students benefit from this linking, but the Links benefit from the program as well. Peers model typical academic and social behavior in educational

environments throughout the school day and in return they gain increased skills in organization, responsibility, problem solving, decision-making, and accountability.


parent involvement in school has a profound impact on student achievement, and students who read every night at home will be more successful in a learning environment




# Growing Food with Aquaponics

When students follow the same general procedures in these common areas, there is less noise, less physical contact and less chaos. Students have responded really well to this change, and many have stepped forward to share how much they like it!

Making a school feel safe takes more than locks on doors. Emotional safety is necessary so students can learn, and that means feeling safe around other children. Staff members have participated in professional development with Dr. Marcia McEvoy, psychologist and reknowned school behavior expert. Dr. McEvoy's work is particularly focused on setting up a school environment where bullying is not tolerated. She came to Twin Lake for two days last year, working directly with students on strategies they can use with friends and peers. Teachers and staff used these opportunities for their own learning, carefully observing how Dr. McEvoy interacted with the students.

To make sure students would have fun and feel rewarded for following these new expectations, the TLE Rocket Slip program was established. Students were acknowledged whenever they showed behaviors "above and beyond" staff expectations. Each month, drawings were held for small rewards such as tickets to events, small toys or games, restaurant certificates, and more. At the end of the year, we drew from the mountain of Rocket Slips for two special rewards! (See article on page 8.)

School-wide behavior expectations continue to be adjusted and improved. Students need structures that are just tight enough to feel safe but not rigid. They need a system that is reliable and predictable but also flexible in adapting to their needs. Staff will continue with the school-wide behavior program in the coming year, with focused efforts on recess and playground.

## **Corner** The Lazy Days of Summer Turn into **Exciting Times of Returning to School**

As summer comes to a close, it's time to turn our attention back to the routines of a new school year. Many times our summer routines are relaxed and sometimes they are non-existent. The transition back to a school routine can sometimes be difficult for students and parents alike.

Below are 10 tips that will help families start the back to school routines in a positive

- 1. Create a family back to school plan a few weeks before school begins so that routines can be established in advance of school starting. Slowly transition bedtime and morning wake up time back to the schedules that will become routine with the return to school. By making these transitions in advance, it will reduce the struggles of getting everyone up and out of the house on time when school is officially back in session.
- Consider doing some daily school routine items in the evening instead of the morning before school. By making small changes in routines, it can have a huge impact on starting everyone's day in a positive direction. Some of the routines you may consider moving to the night before rather than trying to do them in the morning include: laying out clothes to wear; making lunches; and completing and signing off on all homework.
- 3. Plan at least one meal per day to eat together as a family. This meal could be a 15 minute breakfast where everyone shares their plans for the day. Try and keep the time focused on the people in front of you, which means that all electronics are turned off at this time. Enjoy this precious family time together!
- 4. As you sort through all the beginning of the year paperwork and fill out all the updated forms as a part of the registration process, be sure to have a calendar available where all the school events are recorded. Some items that you may want to consider adding into the calendar could include things such as: Open house dates and times, parent/teacher conferences, scheduled breaks and "no school days" for students; special concerts; due dates for special school projects, state testing dates, sporting event schedules, etc. This calendar of events can help keep the entire family organized, reducing the stress for parents
- 5. If your child is moving to a new building within the district, or is new to the district, please make sure to bring your child to the respective building(s) and take a tour. A transition from one school to another can create a great deal of anxiety for any child. Meeting the office staff, meeting some teachers, touring the building, finding the classroom(s) and lockers, etc., can greatly reduce the anxiety your child might be feeling. This pre-visit will help make the first day of school an enjoyable and memorable event.
- As a family, create a designated space where your child can concentrate on homework. Make sure to have all the supplies (paper, pencils, computer, rulers, sticky notes, calculator, tape, markers, a book box/storage space) for each child so that weekly homework materials don't get lost. Having this area set up in advance will ensure that when it is homework time, no time is wasted finding their materials to complete their homework assignments. This pre-organization system will help keep longer-term assignments in a safe place with easy access to the work until the project is completed.
- 7. Create a system for processing school work and school papers. Whether you use a mailbox organizer, a file folder system, or an accordion folder, having something set up prior to school beginning will help keep everyone organized and will set a positive routine right from the beginning of the year.

- 8. If you have a child who struggles staying organized, create simple check-lists (words or pictures) that the child can use to help them complete the routine without constant reminders from an adult or sibling. A checklist and/or a written contract developed in advance will remove many of the power struggles that often occur regarding what, when, and where something needs to be completed.
- To help your child(ren) get back into the school routine, sit down as partners or as a family and collaboratively develop a schedule, checklist, goals, etc., to help outline the routines that everyone will follow. Having your child included in the decision making of this plan, will increase the likelihood that these routines and expectations will be followed. Once completed, make sure to display the agreed upon routines and expectations in a highly visible area. For example, a plan might state: Amanda will complete her homework by 7:00 p.m. on school nights. School work will be completed at the designated workstation set up in the family room. After completing her homework, Amanda will have mom or dad sign the assignment and/or agenda. Once signed, Amanda will place the completed homework in the homework folder inside her backpack. Amanda will turn in her homework folder to her teacher as soon as she walks in the classroom each morning.
- 10. Students need to be in school on a regular basis to have a continuous learning environment that will help them succeed in school and life. There is a great deal of research that shows that when students are absent from school, even 10 days throughout the year, it can have a negative impact on math skills, standardized testing scores, graduation rates, and increases the chance that a child will drop out of school in later grades. Please get your child to school on time, every day so that learning can occur and your child will find continuous success.

The Food Service Department welcomes students back for another great school year! Menus for each building can be found on the school website at www.reeths-puffer.org. Free/reduced school meal applications can be completed online through the school website under the tab "Internet Meal Manager" or at www.lunchapp.com. Paper applications will be available in all school offices.



Free/reduced meal applications must be renewed every year.

Your food service staff will continue to provide healthy meals with more whole grains, fruits, vegetables and low-fat/fat free dairy products. Vegetables are broken down into sub groups (dark green, red/orange, bean/legumes, starch and other) which must be offered weekly. Students are required to take either a serving of fruit or a serving of vegetable. All a la carte items sold to students during the school day must meet the USDA's criteria for Smart Snacks.

Finally, in order to be compliant with the USDA's Paid Lunch Equity we are required to raise paid lunch prices. The cost of an elementary and intermediate paid lunch is now \$2.50 and the cost of a middle and high school paid lunch is \$2.85. Student breakfast prices and prices for reduced breakfast and lunch will not change.

In terms of middle school learning, "this isn't your grandfather's Oldsmobile."

# Stock Market Team Honored in D.C.

Mr. Corbin and a team of students earned a second trip to Washington D.C. to be honored as one of the top ten schools in the annual SIFMA Foundation's stock market competition. Our student team of Jessica Coffell, Alex Wyatt, Olivia Nelson, Garrett Blanshine and Matt Morrison were chaperoned by their personal finance instructor, Mr. Rich Corbin, to receive their recognition on Capitol Hill on June 11. The 14-week competition among teams of high school students is a special version of the Stock Market Game™ where student teams invest a hypothetical \$100,000 in listed stocks, bonds, mutual funds and cash while simultaneously learning the value of saving and investing as they work together to maximize the return of their portfolio. R-P finished with \$139,951.75 earning them a top ten finish and an all-expense paid trip to Washington D.C.; the second year in a row for Mr. Corbin's class.

# Citizenship The R-P Way Guides Positive Decisions

After two full years of implementation, Citizenship the R-P Way is guiding students to make positive decisions. Each marking period, students earn a Citizenship score that is separate from their academic grade in the area of work ethic and time management, respect, and



attendance. The scores are cumulative and are on a four point rubric. The goal is for all students to reach a Citizenship score of 3.5 or higher. At the recent graduation on June 6, 64% of the students earned the honor of wearing a Citizenship metal as they walked across the stage with a cumulative score of 3.5 or above.



As identified by the data collected, our focus for the 2014-15 school year will be to support our students in building skills and life-long habits in the area of work ethic and time management. 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#### REETHS-PUFFER SCHOOLS NON-HOMESTEAD MILLAGE RENEWAL

On Tuesday, November 4, 2014, Reeths-Puffer voters will be asked to approve a renewal of the 18 mill non-homestead property tax levy. This levy does not apply to primary residences. It is levied on businesses, rental homes, second homes, and commercial properties. Voters have approved the 18 mill non-homestead property tax renewals since passing Proposal A in 1993.

The proposal will ask voters to renew the 18 mill operating levy to fully fund our District, as prescribed by state law. The non-homestead levy raises \$3 million annually and represents 9% of the district's general fund budget. This allows the district to continue to receive the full state funding amount, currently \$7,026 per student. This does not affect the millage rate for primary residences and is essential to State of Michigan school funding.
