### Igniting Minds, Fueling Wellness Saturday, June 27th @ 7:15 am






- Work together to convey ideas or illustrate simple concepts relating to a specified project.

### Summer Mathematics

Early mathematical thinking involves understanding that:

- Numbers are composed of smaller numbers.
- Numbers can be taken apart and combined with other numbers to make new numbers.
- Numbers are organized into groups of tens and ones (and hundreds, tens and ones and so forth.)
- Combining numbers to make 10 helps students understand numbers to 100 and beyond.

#### Help build your child's mathematical understanding

- Have your child explain the problem in words and illustrations. This helps students clarify their own thinking.
- When children are solving a problem mentally (no paper and pencil) it helps them to rely on what they know and understand about the numbers instead of just memorizing procedures.

- Allow your child to use concrete materials to guide them in solving problems.
- Count with your child when you are in the car or waiting in line. If you are counting forward to a given number, remember to always count backwards from the same number. You can push your child's understanding of counting forward or back by beginning to count from any given number.
- Play games that encourage breaking apart numbers in different ways.

#### Math in our world!

Math is not just found in the classroom, it is found everywhere we look and in every part of our lives. Summer is a great time to learn how math relates to the real world.

- Open a lemonade stand. (measurement and money skills)
- Enjoy a baseball game. Have fun at the game while having your child keep track of the score or the number of runs each player makes. Have your child determine how many more runs to win the game, all while enjoying the game as a family.
- Bring math alive by cooking as a family. (measurement, time)
- And my favorite is shopping. Most middle and high school students love to shop. Shopping is a great place to practice adding prices together, estimating amounts, solving percentages, practicing money skills, and of course learning self-control.
- Math is a bonus for learning through gardening. Have your child help you measure the space between plants as you plant your garden. Have your child chart the produce that is grown, and if you sell your produce at the farmers market, have your child help collect and make change for the customers.
- Make the family calendar come alive. As a family, chart the special events of the summer on a family events calendar. As you anticipate an upcoming event, have your child figure out how many days left until the event. Have your child keep track of the number of days, hours, and minutes.
- Going out to eat is a great way to practice real life math skills. Restaurant math is perfect for practicing addition, subtraction, tip percentage, and money-counting skills.
- Take a family walk and look for patterns all around you. Ask your child to find things that are the shape of a square, rectangle, or circle.



Curriculum

#### So What Does it Take to Meet this Challenge?

- Students read or are read to for 23 minutes every day. This can be family reading or individual reading.
- Date range of challenge: June 8 through August 31.
- Five "free days" throughout the summer challenge dates are allowed to meet any unique family situations that may arise.

#### So What Counts for Reading?

- Reading together as a family, reading individually, or listening to audio books.
- Reading while being a passenger in the car, while sitting on the beach, in bed at night, at the breakfast table, by the campfire, etc.
- Turning on the closed caption and reading your favorite TV show instead of listening to it.
- Reading a book, a magazine, a how-to book, a website (researching colleges, vacations, etc.).
- Reading anywhere, anytime . . . be creative and have fun! Read to Succeed Read 23!

Reading 23 minutes every day can make a life-long difference in both the short and long term success of our Rocket City families. Good Luck Rocket Readers!

### How can I help my child find academic success?

According to research, the most accurate predictor of a student's achievement in school is not income or social status, but the extent to which that student's family is able to:

- 1. Create a home environment that encourages learning.
- 2. Communicate high, yet reasonable, expectations for their children's achievement and future careers.
- 3. Become involved in their children's education at school and in the community.

These three seemingly simple steps require dedication and commitment from all students, parents and school personnel. The resulting benefit of this investment in time and effort is well worth the future aspirations and success of every child.

At the middle school level, parents are encouraged to:

- · Discuss school activities.
- Monitor out-of-school activities.
- · Volunteer and attend parent-teacher conferences and other school events.
- At the high school level, parents are encouraged to:
- Guide their student toward postsecondary education.
- Make sure they read and do their homework.
- Stress the value of education.

#### Helping your child plan for college and career:

At the beginning of high school, sit down with your child and their teachers, counselor, or other advisor to discuss what it will take for your child to graduate, your child's goals, and his or her plans after high school. Create a plan together to help your child reach these goals, and review it every year to make sure he or she is on track. This plan should include:

- An appropriate course sequence to meet your child's goals. For example, if your child wants to study biosciences in college, he or she will likely need additional or advanced math and science courses to be prepared for college-level coursework.
- The most appropriate extracurricular activities for your child. For example, if your child is interested in journalism or photography, encourage him or her to sign up for the school newspaper or yearbook. These activities will help your child expand his or her learning outside of school and may help foster new hobbies or interests.
- Ways you can help your child prepare for college or a career. For example, if your child is interested in a particular field, look to see if internships exist to build his or her work

experience in that subject area. Look for college fairs to attend, and encourage your child to visit colleges in which he or she might be interested.

• Finding ways to pay for college or advanced training. College can be expensive, but there are lots of ways to get financial help, such as scholarships, grants, work study programs, and student loans. You need to make time for you and your child to do the research. You can start by helping your child fill out the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) during his or her senior year. Visit www.fafsa.ed.gov for help and more information on FAFSA and financial aid.

### Is Your Child Ready for Kindergarten?

Having your child enter Kindergarten is sometimes an emotional decision for parents. This is true for first time parents, as well as for parents with children already in the educational system.

Kindergarten marks the start of a child's educational journey in formalized learning in the areas of reading, writing and math. As a child's first school experience, it may influence the way he or she feels about school for many years to come. It is important to look at your child from characteristics they possess rather than a day of birth. Planning for your child's entry into a formalized setting in which they begin to learn and participate is not an exact science. Below are some basic questions that may help you decide if your child is ready to find school an enjoyable place for learning and growing.

### As parents ask yourself the following questions:

- Is my child used to being separated from me and the family for extended periods on a daily basis?
- Does my child listen to two-step instructions and then follow them independently?
- Is my child independent enough to dress themselves?
- Does my child show an interest in books as a family activity and independently and stays focused for extended periods of time?
- Does my child look for environmental print to read? (i.e., things like McDonald's signs or
  - cereal boxes in the grocery store, finding letters in their name in books, etc.)
    Does my child find interest in counting objects, creating patterns with
    - objects, joining in on counting activities (forward and backwards) with you?
      Does my child show a natural interest in drawing pictures, coloring, writing their name or writing a note to you?
    - Does my child show an interest in and have a genuine curiosity of learning new things?
    - Can my child take turns and play or learn with others in small groups?

If you answered "yes" to most of these questions then your child is probably ready to begin Kindergarten. If you answered "sometimes" to these questions your child may be ready for Kindergarten. A conversation with your building principal about options might be helpful. If you answered "no" to many of these questions, then your child may benefit from another year of a formal preschool before entering Kindergarten.

We know that every child develops at their own pace and we need to take each child where they are and encourage them to grow with a passion for curiosity and life-long learning. With the more rigorous curriculum expectations, some children may benefit from a second year of Kindergarten. Parents may find that their child's learning is just beginning to click at the mid or end of their child's Kindergarten year. If this is the case, we recommend that parents and teachers work collaboratively to determine the right placement for the upcoming year. Some parents may decide to have their child complete another rotation

of Kindergarten. A two-year Kindergarten rotation is not viewed as a retention, rather as a way to meet the learning needs of individual children in order to set them up with a solid foundation to have success throughout their entire educational journey. Education is not a race, rather it is a journey. Each child has a different journey ahead of them, but the end goal will be the same for all; graduating from high school being college and career ready.

## Senator Hansen Reads to TLE Students



Michigan Senator Geoff Hansen stopped by Twin Lake Elementary to read to students for "March is Reading Month!" Senator Hansen selected **Mousetronaut** by Mark Kelly to read to third grade students. Fourth graders enjoyed **Mackinac Bridge** by Gloria Whelan.

Students were excited to share their experience. Claire and Connor felt it was "pretty amazing" to have the State Senator come in. "When he read the story to us, I got sucked in to the book, and I felt like I was there, walking the bridge with him!"

## **Reeths-Puffer Schools** Wins the Certificate of Excellence Award


The Association of School Business Officials (ASBO) International has awarded Reeths-Puffer Schools its Certificate of Excellence in Financial Reporting award for having met or exceeded the program's high standards for financial reporting and accountability.

The District was recognized for its Comprehensive Annual Financial Report for the fiscal year ending 2014. This was the District's first submission for the award. District leadership committed to this new undertaking during the 2013-14 fiscal year. The Finance Department, led by Finance Director Jason Helsen, compiled the necessary information in time for the annual audit. Brickley DeLong, certified public accountants, assisted with some technical aspects of the first-time submission.

The Certificate of Excellence (COE) award confirms the District's commitment to financial accountability and transparency. The District's Strategic Plan includes the valued goal of "the open sharing of District financial information." This award is another symbol of the District's commitment to this goal.


Reeths-Puffer Schools is the only district in Muskegon County that is a current recipient of this award, and one of only a handful in the West Michigan region and the State of Michigan as a whole. ASBO International staff said of the work performed by Reeths-Puffer staff is, "Truly great work for a first-time application." The Reeths-Puffer Comprehensive Annual Financial Report can be retrieved on the District website at www.reeths-puffer.org.

As we enter another year of the budget planning process, a question that is invariably asked is, *How do we spend our money*? The board of education has consistently stated that teaching and learning is the number one priority when making budget decisions. One measure we use to gauge whether we're following that priority is how much of our budget is spent 'in the classroom' versus in other areas. Within our general fund budget, instructional expenditures include direct instruction (teacher salaries and benefits, teaching supplies), pupil support services (guidance counselors, itinerant staff providing special services), and instructional support services (curriculum work, professional development opportunities for teachers). In the most recently completed year, 2013-14, these areas represented over 77% of all general fund expenditures, as shown below.



Another way to better understand our budget is to ask, *What do we spend our money on?* Our industry is driven by people, and as you may guess, we spent the majority of our budget on those people. Over 82% of our budget is spent for salaries and benefits for our employees. When we include contracted personnel, which includes things like substitute teachers, the figure jumps to over 92%. Everything else – utilities, supplies, fuel for our buses – comprises less than 8% of the total, as shown below.

**Reeths-Puffer Schools General Fund** 



- 1. Your child is talking about ideas they discover in school.
- 2. Your child sees things at home, in their community, or on the computer and makes a connection to learning at school.
- 3. Your child seeks information about topics on his/her own.
- 4. Your child asks questions about things they learned in school.
- 5. Your child wants to do more, learn more or turn something they are learning into action outside of school.
- 6. Your child is having conversations with friends that are based on the learning at school.

As we engage more in our learning we begin to see that it goes well beyond our walls!

- Natural Resources & Agriscience




## RPHS Choir Awards from MSVMA District Choral Festival...
