
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

Just like music and art, storytelling is one way we interpret life and search for meaning. It is through the telling of our shared history that we learn and remember the reality that we are all connected. The hardest part about telling a story whether in writing or orally, is knowing where to start. In the discipline of history, we begin our investigations with questions, which lead us to the sources. The sources lead us to more questions: questions about significance, time, space and order which help us to find answers using the evidence. These hard-working seventh-grade historians worked through the process of framing a historical problem to uncover the stories of courageous family members, friends, and strangers who all had one thing in common: the willingness to serve our country and the principles of democracy.

In this project, we heard roughly 84 different stories from American veterans. We discovered new truths about our families, our country, and ourselves. Today and every day we give thanks to our veterans for not only their service and sacrifice but also for their stories of dedication, discipline, love, courage, honor, and commitment. We will never forget.


Mrs. Atchison's Class Constitution!

What Is Mindfulness?

Mindfulness is all about learning to direct our attention to our experience as it unfolds, moment by moment, with open-minded curiosity and acceptance. Rather than worrying about what *has* happened or *might* happen, it trains us to respond skilfully to whatever *is* happening right now, be that good or bad.



How do people learn mindfulness? Mindfulness is always learned in a highly practical way, through experience rather than talk. We gradually learn to direct our attention in a more focused way to whatever is actually happening whether it be our breathing, the sensations in our body, thoughts and feelings, or everyday activities such as walking and eating.

What's the point of mindfulness? In adults, mindfulness training has been shown to improve health and wellbeing. People of all ages report after taking a mindfulness course that they are able to learn more effectively, think more clearly, perform better and they feel calmer, less anxious and less depressed. Mindfulness is now recommended by the National Institute of Clinical Excellence and GPs are referring adults on 8 week courses to reduce stress and help prevent recurrent depression. It is increasingly being used in business to improve staff wellbeing and satisfaction, in sports training to improve performance, and with children and young people and in schools to enhance wellbeing and learning

Is it difficult?

At first the mind wanders constantly, but with practice we learn to sustain our attention and direct it more skilfully. This helps break the grip of unhelpful mental habits, judgements and impulses, making way for greater calm, and for more helpful, kinder and rational thinking about all aspects of life. However, it takes practice!



NM's New Outdoor Deck - Norse Environmental Club



There is a new learning experience at North Muskegon Schools - and it's outside! In 2013, former middle school science teacher Rick Howard initiated the idea of creating an outdoor classroom for the students of NM. A group of middle school student leaders worked with Mr. Howard, Ms. Knuth and architect Harry Wierenga to begin a plan to make their dream a reality! Studies have shown us that physical and mental health problems increase when physical activity and exposure to nature decrease. Our new Green Space and Observation Deck provides an opportunity to enjoy unstructured play in a safe area; serves as an outlet for stress reduction; endows a secure and protected setting for studying nature; allows opportunities for

self-discovery; and promotes creative inquiry and problem solving skills.

Our student group, advised by Ms. Johnson, constructed a design plan and marked out an area for the deck on the school property below the water tower. We received grants and donations to cover the entire cost, and contacted contractors who could help us build. We obtained building, DEQ and county permits, cleared out the invasive blackberry plants covering the area, and created



walkways surrounding the deck area. Our next step in the plan is to add a handicap access ramp to the nature area and to continue beautifying the area with plants and flowers. 

Robotics Team Helps Kids in Need

The Muskegon Area Robotics Students (M.A.R.S.) are continuing their efforts in helping out the local community by providing area families with assistive technology. Earlier this year M.A.R.S. partnered with MI Kids On The Move, an organization that matches up families in need with local robotics teams. The goal is to provide kids who suffer from debilitating illnesses such as Cerebral Palsy with electric ride-in cars so that they may participate in more

activities with their peers and enjoy new freedoms and experiences. The team fundraises the money required to purchase the cars and then assembles and modifies them for each child based on their needs and abilities. All work is done by the robotics students with guidance from adult mentors. The majority of the robotics students come from North Muskegon with some students coming from Reeths-Puffer, Orchard View, Oakridge and home schools.

Last year the high school robotics team had a very successful year, making it all the way to the World Championship which was held at Cobo Hall in Detroit. The 4-day event drew over 400 teams from around the globe and brought 45,000+ visitors in the form of students, parents and spectators to Detroit. At the World Championship the team was awarded the Industrial Design Award by GM for their robot. Due to the unexpected success, the team needed help from the community to make the trip to Detroit a reality and sees this latest activity as a small way to repay the favor. The team has received a number of donations of no longer needed electric cars that they are going to



refurbish so that they can be customized and donated to more local families.

Congratulations to our newest Norse Eagle Scouts!


