Units of study within our EL curriculum continue to extend beyond the classroom, allowing that which is being learned within to go on full display outside of it. Students continue to apply their knowledge and make use of their skills and ideas in real life settings for the betterment of Central, the R-P community, and the greater west Michigan region. Moreover, recent and ongoing sustainability efforts are making these spaces functional year-round, and overall points of pride for our campus. Looking for inspiration this summer and thereafter? Growing our Literacy Culture

The staff at Central continues to create moments and opportunities to grow our literacy culture through evidence-based approaches, using the Essential Instructional Practices as a guidepost for improvement. In particular, we've narrowed our focus on fostering engagement and motivation, small group and individual instruction, equitable classrooms, and parent engagement. As you look to support your child's literacy growth and trajectory at home, consider the following themes that have been woven into our reading month efforts these past two years:

Opportunity: Partner with the school and others, build your home library, and explore the many literacy resources in and around Rocket City! Provide, prepare, and position your child for an ongoing reading journey!

Excitement: When we generate excitement about reading and





writing, literacy engagement increases, and the desire to read grows. Create motivational moments of joy!

Success: Seek to build early confidence, establish goals, and identify an appropriately challenging sweet spot to shape literacy habits and launch sustained success.

Purpose: Motivation increases when students have opportunities to read and write beyond being assigned to do so, such as for enjoyment, to answer their own questions or wonderings, to address community needs, etc.

Choice: Daily opportunities for students to make choices in their reading and writing fosters engagement. Choice is motivating!

Collaboration: Regular opportunities for children to collaborate with others, especially in accordance with their interests, fosters literacy motivation. Kids have the best ideas!

Reward: Best practice around fostering literacy motivation involves avoiding non-reading related rewards and refraining from connecting reading to punishment. Reading itself is the prize!

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As the local food movement continues to grow, the RP Penn team and its students continue to learn about the benefits of supporting local food systems. Visiting local farms, the Muskegon Farmers Market, and learning about water, horticulture, dirt, the earth, xylem, nematodes, recycling, and composting, through their curriculum units throughout the year, these children embrace the fact that they are surrounded by science; science that matters!

Every spring for the past several years, the students at Pennsylvania Elementary visit the Farmers Market, interview the farmers about how far the food travels to get to the market, and wrap up their visit by purchasing a variety of local foods.

They end the year with a "Local Foods Picnic" at a nearby park.

We learn that buying local not only allows us to have a more intimate knowledge with where our food comes from, but it also provides small farmers with the income they need to maintain their business. What these kiddos come to realize is that a variety of vegetables, fruits, meats, spices, bread, eggs, and a variety of other foods, can be purchased, in their backyard.

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Serving Others in Our Community






On Friday, April 15th students from Mrs. Boes' 3rd and 4th grade class volunteered their time and service at a local church.






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Career Tech Center


Look for more information in your email and mail regarding open house and information related to the start of school! Open house is currently scheduled for August 23rd from 6:00-7:30.


I am truly looking forward to kicking off my career with a great school district and community! Go Rockets!

Fifth graders spent 2 months learning about the global water crisis. We investigated where our clean water comes from and where our dirty water goes, we toured the Muskegon Resource Recovery Center as well as the Muskegon Water Filtration Plant. Students read the book A Long Walk to Water and learned about the Civil War in Southern Sudan, the thousands of "lost boys and girls" that spent 10 or more years in a refugee camp and the girls that walked for water twice a day every day. We were also blessed to welcome Mr. Deng Jongkuch into our classroom so that he could share his story with us. He was one of the original "Lost Boys." He is now the executive director of a nonprofit organization called, Partners in Compassionate Care. He is working to bring health care and clean water to communities in Southern Sudan. Fifth Graders got on board to help and between setting up a walk-a-thon and holding a silent art auction, we were able to donate over \$3,000 that will be used to fund a water well at the Bor Medical Clinic in Southern Sudan! Understanding Climate Change Through Project Based Learning

Eighth grade students in Mrs. Mark's and Mrs. Knapp's science classes worked on projects in and out of the classroom while learning about climate change. During the unit, students were able to engage with guest speaker Dr. Stryker from Annis Water Research Institute, helping students make connections on how climate change affects West Michigan. Students created an educational campaign to inform others about the causes and impacts of climate change, while also completing an action project to support mitigation of the impacts of climate change. Google Read and Write

This fall our kids will have more access to content and flexibility with their chromebooks K-12. Our district has spent the last 10 years building infrastructure with bandwidth, piloting best products for a 1 to 1 environment and monitoring the patterns of use with staff and students on their devices.

This "research" model of integrating technology into classrooms and student learning routines has

led us to use google environments, through google classroom and google drive. These tools have offered families the ability to see weekly work in classrooms and student access to class materials 24/7 on their chromebooks. It allows students that are traveling or at school related events to make up work and to communicate with their teachers through the google classroom. It also has allowed us to integrate a management system where teachers can see real time work the students are doing. in groups or within their class assignments, to give real time written feedback.

Most recently, during the pandemic with distance learning, teachers increased their use of video and providing recorded information in their google classrooms. Assessments have been converted to digital form and hard copies of graphics are now in folders for students to pull up on their phones and or chromebooks. Students who live in two homes have access to all materials instead of needing to remember to take it from one home to the next. The idea that google environments have reshaped learning is obvious.

NEXT STEP: Based on all the information and research, we have to ask ourselves a question, it's a very simple question but it's hard to do. WHAT CAN WE DO TO INCREASE ACCESS TO THE CURRICULUM? In a classroom a student has access to peers, visual supports on the walls, tech departments and teachers. How can a student have what they need at home or while traveling to access the curriculum?

This has led us to installing Google Read and Write on our chromebooks district wide. This application has resources that are set up to increase accessibility to students utilizing google classroom and resources that the teachers provide in the classroom. Tools that are consistent and will be available on the "kids" menu with in google will include:

- 1. Ability to highlight text on websites and within documents that are PDF.
- 2. Convert highlighting to note sheets for studying terms and concepts.
- 3. Voice to text for oral to written form connections.
- Text reader for auditory access.
- 5. Convert text to recorded readings for listening on planes, in cars and

phones.

- 6. Text complexity adjustments to change text to a level that students can access content at a text level that is independent.
- 7. Removal of ads from online resources in articles to remove distractions
- 8. Text tracking that highlights words as text readers is being utilized.
- 9. Text block out to black out text that is not part of needed reading.
- 10. All resources will be in a toolbar within google documents.
- 11. It is web based so access on home computers and family devices as each student will have a license.
- 12. Directions read to all students if needed.

We believe that our next step in technology is not better devices but continuing to ask the question: WHAT CAN WE DO TO INCREASE ACCESS TO OUR CURRICULUM?

Learning by Demonstration

"You can observe a lot by just watching." Yogi Berra

Demonstration of Learning: Observation of skills and performance of tasks in a targeted environment for training and proficiency.

This idea that the ultimate evaluation of learning is demonstrating the ability to perform a task to a reasonable level is not new in our culture. Mentors and Apprenticeships have allowed for access to amazing opportunities in the lives of many. Learning is most easily observed when it is being demonstrated. This observation also allows us to find and build on the amazing assets our students have to contribute to the world around them. Demonstrating learning continues to be a way that our kids find their own strengths, roles that they either excel or fail in.

Our students will be inheriting a world that is more connected and built around options. Navigating these options and moving forward to solutions in life, business, relationships, finances, careers and challenges takes many hours of training doing the skills that lead to the ability to navigate these challenges and opportunities. So, at R-P we try to set up many low stake trainings, directly connected to standards, that build skills to navigate this world. Taking detailed notes is an important skill, but it can also be done with voice to text, auto trader, camera phones, audio recorders, google read and write, etc.

A teacher might start a class with a survey asking students, "How do you like to take notes?"

One student might say, "I don't take notes, I take pictures of whatever is shared on google slides." Another student might say, "I use many colored markers and draw pictures that connect with the content." Another

student could say, "I write everything down and then highlight things that the teacher puts on the study guide." Yet another might say, "I have never taken notes." The process of taking notes is not the important thing, it is that it works so that our kids can contribute to class discussions and the challenges around them in positive ways. After they complete their group work and produce something from the information they took notes on, a teacher might ask them, "How did your notes help you?" "What would you do differently to have more initiative or contribute more?" For a teacher this could ultimately be a way to obtain their knowledge of content but also monitor their "skills" that are needed to navigate.

As our students share more about what they need to engage in classes, we are seeing that many of our Rockets are ready to take their learning beyond testing and begin to apply their ideas to the world around them. When they demonstrate their skills, practice observation to learn, they will be more equipped to demonstrate great things in the world.

Place Based Learning, Problem Based Learning, and Project Based Learning

In the year 2022, our kids will have more on demand information stored in their cloud or just a quick scroll away on their handheld devices than a person had access to in 65 years of life before the 1950's. If someone says something that we don't understand, we simply talk into our handheld computer and it will tell us the root meaning, give a picture of the word and its slang use. If we see something that we like, we spend the next 30 minutes looking at pictures of it and finding similar things in Google images. It's amazing to think about the access we have to information, and the opportunities to see, and know, things well beyond our neighborhood, and how easy it is to find networks of people globally that might have similar interests, challenges and connections.

So...at Rocket City we continue to make experiential learning a way to apply knowledge, touch and feel google images, and take learning beyond our walls. We build a sense of belonging together through learning in ways that have actions and outcomes that reach into our community. We cannot do this without your help in just a 6.5-hour school day. It takes all of us, as a community, realizing that learning can take place anywhere, anytime and around any topic as long as our kids and community are engaged.

The 3 ways that Google and Twitter information become knowledge and life skills are Project Based Learning, Placed Based Learning, and Problem Based learning.

Project Based Learning: Creating a final product that is shared with people in the community to improve life within the community. The students spend time researching, connecting with experts, and designing a way to communicate information that engages an audience and contributes to the community around them. This helps kids feel a sense of belonging to R-P, their community, city and region. It also allows students to activate a sense that they make a difference and it is their world they are making a better place.

Examples: Project Based Learning

- 1. Identifying a need in a 3rd world country and creating experiences that allow for the need to be shared, supported and helped. How can we support water shortages in other parts of the world when we have an abundance of fresh water? What can we do as students at R-P to help? What is needed?
- 2. Where in our community can we enhance the experience that visitors have in our community? We are learning about frogs and their role in an ecosystem, how can we share our knowledge with visitors?

Place Based Learning: Connecting our students to their community. The student researches content, then goes to a place of importance to experience and engage in the content within an actual location. Traditionally, we called them field trips or study trips but in place-based learning the students build prior knowledge, have questions that need to be answered while out in the community spaces, and have a direct connection between the classroom content and the application in the community. These community connections lead to our students having the confidence to apply their knowledge for solutions to community challenges here in Muskegon and around the world as well.

Examples of Place Based Learning

- 1. To better understand the ideas, we are trying to implement in our class we will be meeting at the pond behind the school. Here we will perform measurements and impacts of the recent high-water table. Your team will be responsible for creating a presentation to share at a local community forum
- 2. Tomorrow a local food truck will be coming to the school to explain product management, overhead and capital investment in a mobile kitchen. Let's identify 3 questions that are driving our conversation with our expert.

Problem Based Learning: Asking a question that has a real application and possible solutions. The students have their lessons, talents, and interests lead into solving or figuring out potential solutions to the problem. Students often will have small snippets of information shared, and have more questions asked of them by their teacher. Students often feel an increased value as they present their information and findings to experts or share their learning with decision makers to influence the processes in the community, team or classroom.

Examples of Problem Based Learning

- 1. Our opponent has a 6' 7" wide receiver that averages 3 touchdowns a game. Based on his film, our defensive strengths and our film from past games, what tactics should we potentially use?
- 2. The Causeway is going to be shut down, for a month for repairs in both directions. How do we reroute traffic this summer to create an opportunity for Rocket City? Over the next few weeks we will consider business, tourism and local impacts. You will eventually have a chance to share your findings and potential solutions to the civil engineers working on the challenge.

These 3 ways to take a traditional learning environment and turn it into a way we can learn anytime and anywhere will connect our kids to the idea that they belong and can make a difference.
