Happy New Year BIG RED NATION!

As we embark on the new year and work to maintain our resolutions, it is a natural time to reflect on where we are and discuss where we would like to be. I envision a year of real tangible achievements within our school district. These achievements begin by focusing on career readiness, community partnerships that positively impact our students and facility improvements that are a result of your continuous support.

Our district leads the way in Muskegon County with innovative and unique programing, learning, and state of the art facilities. Examples implemented this school year include new MHS courses in Photojournalism, Peer Mediation, Broadcasting, and Amped on Algebra. We continue to expand other offerings of Geometry and Construction, Algebra 2 and Construction and our student-led school store. At the middle school we have introduced Design Thinking, Peer Mediation and a student-led Urban Garden Co-Op experience, which are the first steps toward transforming our middle school learning environment. In grades K-5 we continue with our rich history of offering Two-Way Immersion (dual language education), piloting PK4ALL (preschool for all), re-introducing Band as a pilot for fifth grade at Oakview and we steadily work toward greater teacher autonomy.

This new year will mark the debuting of renovated and themebased elementary schools. In the fall Bunker Elementary will be equipped with our first state-of-the-art STEAM lab for all students to use in their exploration of Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Mathematics. This STEAM lab will be the first of multiple STEAM labs across our district as we begin the renovation processes at Marquette, Oakview, Glenside and the MHS campus. Sadly, we will bid farewell to Moon Elementary after over 100 years of educating our youngest students, but this makes way for Moon to transform into a community education building, which will serve multiple ages of students.

Our progress as a district is only possible because our BIG RED NATION continues to support and invest in our schools, students and staff. The financial support with the passing of bonds and millages have defined a new collective future for our community. This May the restoration of our non-homestead millage and the renewal of our county-wide technology and security millage will appear on the ballot. Historically, both of these have served our children well.

Our bright future allows us to remain ambitious in reaching for the stars via innovation and accomplishment. We should be guided by the words of Maya Angelou, "The desire to reach for the stars is ambitious. The desire to reach hearts is wise." It is through this wisdom that we can work together to touch the hearts and minds of all children in our community. Whether you are in a school with your student, or going by a school in your neighborhood, I am sure you have noticed construction. School buildings are in a little bit of controlled chaos with construction either ongoing or upcoming in all of our buildings. I encourage you to take a walk or drive by Laketon and

CURRICULUM

Muskegon High School is proud to announce the new Broadcasting class!



Students in the class are learning about such topics as ethics in journalism, freedom of the press, and media bias. They are also learning the history of broadcast journalism, basic camera operations, how to program and use a teleprompter and the skills needed to edit videos.



By using the QR code above, you view students' very first projects for the MHS Broadcasting students. For these videos they needed to gather B-roll footage, write and rehearse scripts, and learn how to use the TriCaster studio. Students operated 100% of the equipment and produced their videos using a team approach. A special thanks to our Broadcasting teacher, Mrs. Carter who is very knowledgeable, patient and kind!

Muskegon High School has introduced a NEW Photojournalism class!

Students use state of the art Apple iMac computers equipped with Adobe Photoshop to edit the photos taken with Canon DSLR cameras and a digital camera on a smartphone. Students are also advancing their written storytelling ability in the journalism aspect of the course by using the Google Suite.

2023 Winter Science Update

Welcome to 2023! Hard to believe our school year here at MPS is already halfway over. With the new year comes some new and exciting happenings for science around the district.

Through the bond, Bunker Elementary has been able to install a new STEAM lab classroom in their building dedicated to science, technology, engineering, and math. They are partnering with Grand Valley State University's Annis Water Resources Institute which will allow an exciting collaboration in which Bunker's students will learn more about the freshwater resources Muskegon County has to offer.





One of the plans include the upper elementary grade levels taking an educational trip out on Muskegon Lake aboard the W.G. Jackson to study the water. Another plan is called "Salmon in the Classroom." In this program, students raise salmon in a big aquarium in the classroom until they are ready to be released into the wild. They then take

a trip to a local river to release the salmon into their natural habitat!

Muskegon Middle School is also in the middle of some exciting new news. The construction on the new Charles Hackley Middle School is progressing nicely. Our current team of middle school science teachers were able to meet and pick out furniture for the new building along with some other ideas to make the new science classrooms state of the art and ready for some great learning. I know our teachers are excited about the building and our students should be too!

Tornado in a Bottle


Here is a fun activity you can do at home with your child called Tornado in a Bottle. You can create your own tornado in a bottle by following the directions below:

MATERIALS:

- An adult helper
- Empty Glass Bottle with Lid
- 3-4 tablespoons Glitter (the more glitter the better!)
- Funnel
- Water

PROCEDURE:

1. Use the funnel to put 3-4 tablespoons of glitter in an empty glass jar.



- 2. Next, fill the jar about 3/4 full of water.
- 3. Put the lid back on the jar and make sure it is really tight.
- 4. Turn the bottle upside down and guickly move the bottle in a circular motion for 10-15 seconds.
- 5. Finally, set the bottle down on the table and observe the tornado that has formed.

HELPFUL TIP: It will take some practice to get the tornado to show up as much as the one in the picture above. But even with a little shaking, a child should be able to get the water and glitter to spin around in the bottle.

Q: How Does the Tornado in a Bottle Science Experiment Work?

A: When you spin the bottle in a circular motion it creates a water vortex that looks like a tornado. The water spins around the center of the vortex because of centripetal force. Centripetal force is any force that causes an object (in this case water) to move in a circular path. Because there is glitter in the water you can see the spinning water more clearly. The glitter is similar to the dust and debris that are found spinning in an actual tornado.

Learning math is often thought of as a lonely activity that students should do by themselves. But, we now know that when students work together learning is strengthened and lasts longer. Talking and interacting with others not only helps children learn math, it also helps their brains to grow as they learn how to think strategically, communicate respectfully with others, take turns, and other very important skills.

One way Big Red elementary students work together to learn math is through playing math games. At Marquette Elementary, 4th grade students get together once a week with 2nd grade math buddies to play strategic math games that help them learn and practice extended counting, place value, fluency with facts, and other math concepts. At Moon Elementary, 2nd grade students play the game Salute! to practice addition and subtraction facts. Students at Oakview and Bunker also work together to play math games as a regular part of their daily math instruction.

Reading - The Magic of 20 Minutes

At Muskegon Public Schools, our Kindergarten through 8th grade students are receiving their reading instruction with a program called Success for All (SFA). A very important part of that program is the expectation that students read for a minimum of 20 minutes every day at home. In addition to the reading, we ask that students complete a response form, signed by parents, that is returned to school each day. This response form varies by age, grade level, and teacher expectation.

What does this look like for my child? The main purposes for this expectation are to help your child develop fluency (reading smoothly, accurately, and with expression), and maybe more importantly, to develop a love of reading. Most students will bring a book home from school, but if your child has abundant books at home, or a library card, any book will do, as long as the book is of interest to your child. Make this an enjoyable experience. Listen to your child read if possible. It's not a tutoring session, and the reading may not be perfect. But the time spent practicing and the bonding you will have with your child is priceless.

How does 20 minutes a day help? There is a wealth of research supporting daily reading. Reading is "brain food." It provides one of the most enriching and complex brain activities available in life.

Reading daily improves listening skills and early literacy skills. Reading daily allows time for children to practice, and the more we practice something, the better we get. A child with strong reading skills will succeed and thrive in school. Reading daily together can help improve your relationship with your child.

Do you need more convincing? Here are some statistics supporting 20 minutes of daily reading:

- If a child reads for 20 minutes every day, they are exposed to about 1.8 million words of text every year.
- If families read together for 20 minutes a day, 7 days a week, they get more than 121 hours of bonding time every year!
- For every year you read with your child, average lifetime earnings increase by \$50,000. You make a \$250,000 gift to your child from birth to age five by reading aloud, just 20 minutes a day.
- Children who have not developed some basic literacy skills by the time they enter school are 3 - 4 times more likely to drop out in later years.



Parents and families of MPS students, please put aside just 20 minutes a day to work this magic!

OSI Department Updates

Muskegon Public Schools has been engaging in a program supported by Grand Valley State University. It is called P2P- or Peer-to-Peer and it is a school-wide program designed to increase academic, independence, and social engagement opportunities for students with autism and other disabilities. Peers without disabilities learn about their schoolmates with developmental or intellectual disabilities and it provides students knowledge and skills to increase understanding and acceptance. Students learn to advocate with, and for students with disabilities. Through school and extracurricular activities, peers model typical academic and social behavior while students with disabilities can practice and use skills in natural settings by learning from peers in a positive and dignified manner. Authentic relationships form as students actively participate in activities together. These activities can include painting, studying, playing board games, crafting, or sports. The P2P is alive and thriving at Muskegon High School. What's new for 2023 is that the program is expanding! The students involved in the Muskegon High School program are taking the skills they've used and are going into the elementary classrooms! The Muskegon High School peers will be training older elementary students on how to become peers to younger elementary students! Both Marquette and Bunker Elementaries are hosting peer programs and will also be participants in the Muskegon High School P2P student-led training. They will focus on friendship and belonging with the goal of making friends, laughing and having fun all together. The results have created a growing atmosphere of acceptance of diversity and inclusivity!

21st CCLC IMPACT Program Tunes In To Tune Up

A new West Michigan Symphony string instrument program was launched this fall at Marquette Elementary and Oakview Elementary Schools as part of the 21st Century Community Learning Center Impact Program. 21 students are enrolled in the charter class in this after-school program. Tune Up students receive free use of a musical instrument and multiple hours of weekly instruction in ensemble and sectional lessons.

The West Michigan Symphony Tune Up program allows Impact students to enroll for free in this exciting new music class. Students receive free use of a violin or viola while enrolled in the program, learn to play that instrument, participate in ensemble and sectional lessons, meet professional musicians and guest artists, and receive music and academic support from experienced teaching artists and qualified staff.

Tune Up program goals are to work in tandem, and in support of, the successful Muskegon Middle School and High School Orchestra programs. Students will have the opportunity to stay in

the Tune Up program throughout the elementary grades and move into their middle school orchestra program if they choose.

Because of the vision of the WMS and the support of the community through numerous donations, Tune Up has become a reality. Students not only have the opportunity to gain a new skill and new experiences, but Tune Up provides them an early pathway to Muskegon Public School Orchestra.

MPS Enrollment

All MPS families enroll their student(s) online. Simply go to our website (www.muskegonpublicschools.org) and select the enrollment link. You can take a picture of all required documents to upload during the online enrollment process. All our buildings have computers available.

If you have any issues with uploading the required documents, make sure to answer all the questions and you can email the documents directly to me (bkota@mpsk12.net), or you can bring them to any one of our buildings.

Required Documents:

- Two proofs of residency: MUST provide a copy of your utility bill, assessment/property tax statement, rental/lease agreement (must include landlord's telephone and signature), no junk mail. Must be removed from the envelope before providing the proof.
- Parent/Guardian's Identification: Driver's license or passport
- Birth Certificate: An original certified/state issued birth certificate that can be viewed and copied by MPS
- Official Michigan Immunization Records: State law requires that your child's immunizations must be up-to-date or your child cannot enter school. Pick up a copy from your local health department or doctor's office.
- Custody/Guardianship court documents (if applicable)
- Copy of most current Special Education/IEP (if applicable)
- Transcripts and current grades from previous school for High School students

TECHNOLOGY

Hello Big Red Nation,

Networking upgrades - We are in the planning phases of upgrading our network infrastructure district-wide with new equipment. The last upgrade was completed in 2016, so it's time for



a refresh. We've also updated the fiber in some of our buildings as part of the bond work and hope to do the same in the rest of our buildings as the bond work continues. Upgrading fiber will help ready the district's infrastructure to keep pace as the speed of network connections continue to increase.

Classroom technology upgrades - As we work through the 2020 Bond project we're taking the time to upgrade some of the technology used in the classrooms by students and teachers. Technology is always changing so we have to make sure we're keeping pace. One size doesn't fit all so we always make sure that what we implement aligns with the district's goals. The Charles Hackley Middle School will feature new technology including, audio-visual (AV), digital signage and STEM labs. Bunker Elementary will be the first school to feature a brand new STEM lab later this school year!

The high school has gone through quite a bit of work recently as part of the bond project and one major upgrade that happened is the installation of a new surveillance system. This camera system features analytics which will allow administration to track an individual or item throughout the campus without sitting for hours and looking through tons of video. We just set the rules in the system to identify what we're looking for and the system does the bulk of the work. We also have new door access controls that integrate with this new surveillance system.

We're also in the second year of our four year Chromebook refresh plan. Students in Kindergarten and 1st grade are issued a touchscreen Chromebook while students in grades third through twelve are issued non-touchscreen devices. This year, we refreshed devices in grades Kindergarten, 2nd, 6th, and 9th.



- Restoration of the Non-Homestead millage. This is to authorize adding two mills to our operating millage (collection cannot exceed 18 mills) to avoid further rollback of the 18 mills as a result of the Headlee rollback. When property taxes rise more than the rate of inflation, operating millages get decreased, or rolled back, as result of the Headlee Amendment in Michigan's constitution. Passage of this proposal would allow the district to return to the full 18 mills of non-homestead property tax and maintain a buffer for the future.
- Renewal of the countywide technology and security millage of .9831 mills. This is NOT a tax increase! The same .9831 mill for technology and security would continue from 2024-2033. These funds are designated to be used for technology and security only.



NEW CITY MANAGER

NEW COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT MANAGER

Our city commission and leadership staff are committed to improving and increasing communication and connection with our residents, workers, business owners, and visitors. We have developed and established a new position to lead the effort, and our new Community Engagement Manager, Deborah Santiago Sweet, started in November. Deborah is a longtime Muskegon resident and is grateful to be in this new role. She will be working among residents, city staff, and our elected officials to bring fresh and transparent updates to you and to ensure your ideas and concerns are being considered. To do this we'll be enhancing existing communication channels, and we'll be launching new ways to hear from and communicate with our community. What's up first? Keep an eye out for a recurring newsletter that will be hitting your mailboxes soon. This will be a key source of information for residents. Deborah looks forward to meeting (and hearing from) more Muskegon residents soon.

NEW PARKS AND RECREATION FOCUS

Some of you may have benefitted from the parks and recreation programming that used to be prevalent in the city. I know I spent many summer days at the park making arts and crafts projects, and my mom still has a potholder or two from those days. Our commissioners support a return of more parks programming, taking something old and making it new again. A second new position, for a Parks and Recreation Director, was included in our budget this year. The new director will be seeking input on our Parks and Recreation Plan and what programming is needed. We are anxious to partner with groups who are already providing recreation programming and help to grow programs that will benefit our neighbors. Please watch for opportunities to share your input.

NEW HOMES

As the city continues to partner with developers to construct new homes on vacant lots within our neighborhoods, we are hoping to bring new neighbors to Muskegon and new students to the school district. You will see new homes in Nelson, McLaughlin, Jackson Hill, Campbell Field, and Marquette neighborhoods. Our goal is that every neighborhood is complete and vibrant, offering housing options for all types of families.

NEW PUBLIC SAFETY EFFORTS

Our Public Safety Division has begun a new initiative with the school district. Our police and fire staff are serving meals to students in an effort to open positive lines of communication between public safety staff and students. The first meal was served at the high school just prior to Thanksgiving, and the goal is to serve at every school in the city.

NEW TRAFFIC CONFIGURATION

You have likely seen the new traffic configuration on Terrace Street downtown. The boulevard has been removed between Shoreline Drive and Muskegon Avenue, and the next phase will be completed in the spring. When complete, Terrace Street will be an extension of Peck Street with two-way traffic and parking on both sides of the street. The city is seeking funding for a bike path to be constructed along Sanford Street between Laketon Avenue and Apple Avenue, and continuing along Terrace Street to connect to the existing bike path along Shoreline Drive. This new path will create an important link between two regional trail systems and offer a direct link for improved transportation.

NEW WEBSITE

Lastly, the city recently unveiled our new website, www.muskegon-mi.gov. Please take some time to review it and share your thoughts with us.

- What book are you planning to read next?




Hackley Public Library Partnership

Peer Mediation: A healthy way to negotiate conflict.

Design Thinking

This year, Muskegon Middle School started a new elective in collaboration with the MAISD Career Technical Center. Design thinking is a process for solving problems by prioritizing the consumer's needs above all else. It relies on observing, with empathy, how people interact with their environments, and employs an iterative, hands-on approach to creating innovative solutions. To be truly human-centered, designers watch how people use a product or service and continue to refine the product or service in order to improve the consumer's experience. In order to do this, they use their background knowledge, research and reach out to community businesses to complete the project. Once the students complete their prototypes, they present their work to a team of educators, administrators, and community partners. Our 6th graders spend nine weeks in this class whereas our 7th and 8th graders engage in this course for a semester. It is no surprise that our students have amazing ideas that illustrate their deep reflection on how to solve problems.

This Year in Art...

This year in ART with Ms. Chamberlain, students will learn about themselves and the world around them through a comprehensive visual arts education program. Students can look forward to growing their brains and achieving benchmarks in their artistic development. We will explore the elements of art (line, shape, color, form, value, texture, and space), and the principles of design (balance, unity, variety, proportion, emphasis, pattern, and movement), as well as integrated standards from other disciplines such as science, history, math, reading, writing, social emotional learning (SEL), and character development.

Bunker artists will be recognized and celebrated throughout the school year with the "Featured Artist of the Week" showcase on the first floor, rotating hallway bulletin board displays, a slideshow on the front office monitor, and student ART show opportunities. There are two student ART show opportunities available to Bunker artists: the annual "Expressions" Student Art Show at the Muskegon Museum of Art in late-April (Muskegon County-wide student art show), and the annual MPS K-12 District-wide Student Art Show at the Muskegon High School library in mid-May.

The continuation of the Aesthetics Education (AE) Program, in partnership with







the MAISD, will be integrated into the visual arts program here at Bunker Elementary. AE is an inquiry based approach to arts education, where two of our Bunker BIG RED classes will have the opportunity to work with Teaching Artists from our community, learn about local works of art, and experience the Muskegon Museum of Art. The Poppen Program will also be available to qualifying 3rd-5th grade Bunker students. Nancy and Sherman Poppen established the Nancy K. Poppen Fund of Community Foundation for Muskegon County in 1993 to provide fine and performing arts opportunities for eligible Muskegon Public School students who wish to advance their talents through private study beyond the classroom.

Due to construction, the ART room will be moving to the third floor of our Bunker building for the remainder of the academic year. Learning will continue with fun skill-building activities and artwork



Welcome to our ECSE program at Marquette.

We are excited to provide a high quality early childhood education program to our Muskegon community. Through Pre-K for All and Early Childhood Special Education, we provide high quality early childhood education opportunities that offer all



children and families a strong start in school and life. Our students learn through play, experiences, and positive relationships. Our programs help children develop language, skills, and knowledge of the world. Our Early Childhood Special Education (ECSE) services include special instruction and related services provided to young children, ages three through five, who qualify under the Individuals with Disabilities Act.

In our early childhood classrooms, you can expect our students to begin and discover

what makes them unique and learn to play with others, show curiosity, ask questions, share creative ideas, and learn and practice new concepts. We encourage our students with any ability level to become a member of the classroom community. Using the inclusion model, we safely explore new ideas, materials, which will better prepare them for language, math, and critical thinking skills.

In a typical classroom day, your preschooler will learn in many different ways, including but not limited to whole group and small group activities, choice time where they are able to work with a variety of materials, and outdoor playtime with a focus on inclusion. Ensuring all learning abilities are part of the same learning community. These experiences lay the foundation for your child's future success in school and life. Our ECSE program focuses on the following concepts.

- Early social and emotional skills, such as sharing, solving social problems, and expressing and managing their feelings
- Learning skills such as problem solving, imaginative thinking, and persistence
- Pre-reading and writing skills, such as understanding that letters have meaning and can be combined to form words, and that reading and writing can be used to share information and ideas
- Early math skills, such as learning about numbers, shapes, sorting and patterns
- Physical strength and coordination skills, such as running and being able to use paint brushes and crayons.

We are excited to serve our Muskegon community and continue to ensure all learners have equal access and opportunities for education.

ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS - GLENSIDE

Great Partnership

The Michigan Education Corps' (MEC) Early Learning Corps has returned for the third year of service at Glenside Early Childhood Center (ECC). We are so fortunate that the strong partnership between MEC and Glenside ECC has grown to incorporate five team members for the 2022-23 school year – An increase from what was originally two back in 2020. The increase in Early Learning Corps members gives our program the capacity to serve and develop relationships with 80 of our pre-k students.

The Early Learning Corps program focuses on pre-k aged children to prepare them for kindergarten by embedding highly trained members, also known as interventionists, who serve through AmeriCorps in a classroom where they spend the entire day interacting with students and serving alongside the teaching staff.

Interventionists assess each student in the class three times a year using the Preschool Early Literacy Indicators (PELI) and Early Math Inventory (EMI) assessments. Based on the data gathered from these assessments, the classroom team (Lead Teacher, Associate Teacher, Early Learning Corps Interventionists, Internal Coach, and Coaching Specialist) determines which students could benefit from targeted interventions and regularly monitor the student's progress to ensure that they are using the most appropriate intervention for that student's needs. Our data has shown that this extra time with students gives them increased skills and improves their readiness for Kindergarten and their future success in education.

Early Learning Corps is among three high-dosage, evidence-based tutoring programs delivered through Michigan Education Corps, an initiative of the Hope Network. The other two programs that serve throughout Michigan focus on kindergarten through third-grade reading literacy (Reading Corps) and fourth through eighth-grade math literacy (MEC Math Corps).

It takes a team to make Early Learning Corps a success. We are so fortunate to have support from the MAISD, Michigan Education Corps, and Glenside ECC staff. Their support of our members is vital to ensuring the success of this program.
