

4th Graders Place 2nd in Statewide Math Competition!

The students in Mrs. Fortmeyer's 4th grade class entered a Michigan Math competition through SumDog.com, which is an online math site that offers statewide and nationwide competitions throughout the year. This statewide competition ran from Friday, March 10 through Thursday, March 17. On the day before the contest ended, North Muskegon moved from 6th place to 2nd place, competing against over 1,000 students from other schools in Michigan, grades K - 8th grade. On March 14, our 4th graders won the high score of the day!

As the deadline approached, our NM students began frantically answering math questions to move up on the leaderboard, but then so did every other school. The competition was fierce, but NM kept inching forward question by question. Our final score was 625, for a strong 2nd place finish! Students



reviewed grade level concepts in all five math domains covered in our 4th grade Michigan curriculum and learned that math IS fun!

The overall winners were the classes that scoreed highest through the contest. The top three classes were:














NORSE LEARN ABOUT THE NEWS!

IRACHARITABLE DISTRIBUTIONS

If you wish to donate your RMD to charity, you may be able to take advantage of the Qualified Charitable Distribution provision available to Traditional and Roth IRA owners (or beneficiaries after the death of the owners) who are age 72 or older. If eligible, you can make a Qualified Charitable Distribution of up to \$100,000 in the aggregate per year directly from your IRAs to an eligible organization without incurring any adverse federal income tax consequences. The distribution counts for the purposes of the RMD from IRAs, but is not included in calculating the individual taxpayer's limitation on charitable deductions in the year the donation was made. NEF Grants Awarded Spring 2023



NM Students "Take Down Tobacco!"

One of our 5th grade parents, Aimee Taylor, serves as a Tobacco Reduction Case Manager at Trinity Health in Muskegon. Ms. Taylor reached out to Ms. Stephanie Marietti, one of our 5th grade teaching team, to coordinate a "Take Down Tobacco" education day for our NM students grades DK-12. Ms. Marietti's students acted as Student Leaders,



and received education and training from Trinity Health staff prior to our event on Wednesday, March 29. They helped to educate their peers, participated in setting up the displays, and acted as assistants to the Trinity Health staff during the event. Using visual displays, small group instruction, and interactive games, the team shared age-appropriate

information about the impact of tobacco use, the ways that tobacco is marketed to young people, and how every person can be a compassionate advocate for avoiding tobacco and encouraging good health. We appreciate the Trinity Health staff and our 5th grade Norsemen for their leadership in creating a healthier community!











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Choral MS/HS Solo & Ensemble

Every student who finds themselves in Choir is challenged not only to read and translate music into sound, they are also challenged with interpreting that music and making it their own. Twice a year, MSVMA holds a Solo and Ensemble event where students go before a judge and perform two contrasting pieces not only to display their skill but also to challenge themselves to better themselves as musicians. On February 11th, North Muskegon had 35 middle school and high school students take on this challenge. Many of the performances received the highest rating possible, with a couple of performances receiving perfect scores. Some of our students have qualified and chosen to perform at state Solo and Ensemble.















NORTH MUSKEGON MILITARY WALL

The American veteran is special. From the bitter temperatures of Valley Forge, Chosin reservoir, and the Bulge, to the tragedies at River Raisin, Wounded Knee, and Malmedy the United States soldier, sailor, marine and airmen has persevered. In the most difficult time in our history, the Veteran has stepped up to the call of our country to execute the foreign policy of our nation. The unwavering commitment and selflessness to the United States Constitution and to our nation should be recognized and honored for those who have served our country, especially the ones who gave their lives. The Military Wall at North Muskegon High School was created to recognize all veterans from North Muskegon High School, to honor the men and women who served our country and made the ultimate sacrifice, and continue this project for future generations.

The creation of the Military Wall was inspired by the students of North Muskegon High School. With the help of the social studies department and Richard Mullally (Class of 1963), students researched records from a variety of sources to create a master list of alumni who have honorably served in the military. Although the list of veterans at North Muskegon High school is far from complete, the research continues. One of the events that helped to launch this student driven project was our awards ceremony on November 11th, 2019. During this ceremony, in collaboration with our local Veterans of Foreign War Don Rea Post #8846, our school body respectfully listened to numerous engaging speakers. One of those speakers was retired Rear Admiral John Hutson.

John Hutson graduated from North Muskegon High School in 1965. Mr. Hutson spoke to the student body about his time at North Muskegon and the wonderful memories made here as a student. He spoke of one particular classmate, John Laning. Mr. Laning was a friend and classmate of Mr. Hutson, who gave his life in Vietnam in 1967. Mr. Laning was a Navy corpsman attached to Company D, First Battalion, Fourth Marines.

In the Con Thien region of Vietnam, the numerically superior North Vietnamese Army had begun to overrun the perimeter. Without hesitation, Mr. Laning jumped to the medical aid of wounded Marines. While saving the lives of several Marines, he was cut down by enemy fire. He was posthumously awarded the silver star. John Laning's personal sacrifice is the embodiment of pure patriotism. Unfortunately, Mr. Laning is not the only student from North Muskegon to lose their young life in the service of our country. Our military board across from the high school office is dedicated to such sacrifice.

This student driven project is far from complete. We will continue the research and connect with the

NM Varsity Wrestling Returns!

The 2022-2023 winter sports season marked the return of Varsity Wrestling to North Muskegon High School, after a lapse of approximately 45 years. While North Muskegon has had a middle school team the last four years and some small co-op high school programs shared with Holton and Muskegon

Catholic Schools, the Norse began to host their own independent, completely in-district program this past season! The squad of approximately 15 male and female athletes quickly made a name for themselves by outworking opponents and growing more competitive every single week.

Season highlights included the sole home meet where the Norse dominated both Holton (54-11) and Oakridge (51-22) for their fans, the Grand Haven Big Buc Tournament where nine wrestlers earned medals, and the razor-thin loss to District Champion Ravenna (37-39) in the postseason.

Head Coach Jonathan Allen, also the Elementary Principal, could not be prouder of his team. "It's impossible to know exactly what to expect when you start a new program - especially one as




Talent Show MS/HS


