


Penn's Feathered Friends

Kindergarteners at Penn are no strangers to caring for chickens. Caring for chickens is full of life lessons that could benefit these kiddos for their entire lives. Our feathered friends teach problem solving, patience, responsibility, team work, and respect for other creatures. They give us all something to care about besides each other and our school environment, all of which play a vital role in our daily school life. Each day, no matter what the weather, our "compost commanders" head to the coop and feed the chickens our lunch scraps, change out their water, and collect the eggs. Each of the classes also take turns cleaning out the coop and nesting boxes, putting down new bedding, and raking the outside run. Recently at summer gardening, the parents watched in amazement as the kiddos cleaned and replenished the coop and run with no direction at all from the teachers.

fertilized eggs. We borrowed an incubator and the kids were in charge of making sure the temperature and humidity were kept in the proper range. They also kept track of the days. One fascinating thing this experience gave us was watching the development of the embryo over time. Candling the eggs gave us a sneak peek at what was going on inside that little egg. Truly amazing! Finally, the much anticipated day 21 came, and as if on cue, began the hatching process as we watched in amazement. We successfully hatched and raised 6 chicks.




Purple Up Fun!





make a difference in our community. The garden is one of the projects this class decided to work on this Spring along with holding a Kids' Food Basket Drive.





Flex Time To Meet Specific Needs

A goal in all that we do is to meet students where they are in order to maximize their full potential. One of the greatest, and most challenging, parts of teaching and learning is that each student is unique and their needs are also unique. We design daily lessons with this in mind and we are also excited that next year to add on by utilizing 40 minutes twice a week in a very targeted and specific way to meet the varied needs of our students. A foundation of this Flex Time will be a relationship that will be established with a teacher over the entire four years of a students' career at the high school. Relationships are at the core of everything we do. Prior to Flex Time, we will utilize technology within PowerSchool for students to report to the class where they need reteaching, preteaching, or assessment support. Students will also have the opportunity to engage in increased post-secondary preparation and planning, mental health supports, and a variety of activities that improve our school climate and culture. Student voice and leadership is essential to the success of our building and will also be a driving force for the opportunity the Flex Time will provide students at the high school. We can't wait to see our students thrive with this intentional use of flexible time.

Sometimes Things Stay the Same


There are some Reeths-Puffer strategies that will stay the same that families and students can expect heading into the
