






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# **Bonded Construction Update**

our down and one to go! Ross Park Elementary construction was completed prior to our October break. Our daycare wing and remaining interior classrooms and media center were finished over the summer and early fall and all students and staff are in their respective homes. The original construction cost was \$20,249,453. After contingencies and additional change orders, final construction cost is \$21,105,174.

I'd like to thank all of our elementary building's staff and students for their flexibility and patience over the last four years of construction.

The Middle School seventh grade wing was renovated over the past summer. The adjoining locker commons addition was completed at the October break

and students are using the new space. Over the school year we will be renovating the remaining classrooms and bathrooms surrounding the media center. We hope to break ground on the sixth grade locker commons this December in order to have that area and the sixth grade wing completed prior to the start of school next September.



This will be the final summer of construction relating to the \$93 million bond passed in November 2018. I would again like to thank the community for its support of this project.



### **College and Career Course Exploration: Post Secondary preparation**

Over 400 MSHS students participated at either the Career Tech Center or a Career Technical Experience here at MSHS. There are 16 programs that are offered at the CTC building. 122 students in the first trimester were enrolled in a variety of opportunities. Students can earn articulated credit and certifications in their programs along with acquiring skills preparing them for potential careers. Here at MSHS there are 17 CTE programs offered to students. 182 students in the first trimester were enrolled in these courses. In addition, MSHS offers foundry, metals, and woodshop courses. Students can also participate in work based learning opportunities to earn HS credit. Many of the marketing students manage and operate the MSHS Anchor Cafe coffee shop learning entrepreneurship skills.

The College Board announced that Mona Shores High School has been named to the Advanced Placement® Program (AP®) School Honor Roll, earning gold distinction in the majority of categories.



The AP® School Honor Roll recognizes schools whose AP programs are delivering results for students while broadening access. Schools can earn this recognition annually based on criteria that reflect a commitment to increasing college-going culture, providing opportunities for students to earn college credit, and maximizing college readiness.

Mona Shores had 44% of seniors who took at least one AP exam during high school, 37% of seniors scoring a three or higher on at least one AP exam, and 13% of seniors who took five or more AP exams!

# Counselor's Corner

The mission of the Mona Shores High School Guidance and Counseling Program is to provide support for student achievement in partnership with parents, staff and community. Counseling services will be provided in a safe and positive environment with a focus on college, career and life readiness.

### **COLLEGE, CAREER AND LIFE READY!**

In an effort to ensure that all students are College, Career and Life Ready, we employ a wide variety of tools to assist them. We begin early utilizing career interest inventories to assist students in identifying possible career pathways. Currently, we utilize XELLO. Xello helps students plan their own unique journey whether it involves a trade, college, university, entrepreneurship, or other training. Our district will develop Educational Development Plans (EDP) with students in order for them to understand their skills, values, career choices and college training options. The district shares a Career Specialist that is based out of the MAISD that may facilitate work based learning opportunities for students that include job shadows, externships, and internships. In addition to the learning opportunities, students are also exposed to several career exploration events such as: Modern Manufacturing Week, MiCareerQuest, a tour of the Muskegon Area Career Tech Center, and the Senior Job Expo. There are lots of options for students! As we approach the new scheduling season, if interested in any of these or to learn more information, please contact the counseling office.

### STUDENT SCHEDULING FOR 2024-2025 BEGINS IN JANUARY

Counselors will begin meeting with students regarding scheduling shortly after the holiday break. Similar to last year, ALL students will receive scheduling instructions at the same time. Students should review their historical grades in their portals to review previous classes and their current schedules to complete their Graduation Audit and update their four year plan. Parents can assist their students in this process by reviewing their choices, signing the course selection sheet, reminding them to return the materials to school on time and finally scheduling with them online at home. Counselors and students will meet individually during this time to review their scheduled course selections for accuracy and planning.

### **FAFSA**

Students should submit the Free Application for Federal Student Aid, or FAFSA, for each school year to qualify for grants, scholarships, and federal work-study. Please note that completion of the FAFSA is required for both the Muskegon Promise and Community Foundation For Muskegon County Scholarships. New for 2024-2025, The opening date for FAFSA was pushed back to December. Please Note: You can call the Financial Aid Office at Baker College or Muskegon Community College and get help for FREE on filling out the Financial Aid Form. THE MUSKEGON AREA PROMISE: The Muskegon Area Promise makes a unique commitment to the young people of our community – if they work hard they will be able to earn at least a two-year college degree tuition free. The Promise Scholarship is an award promised to resident graduates of high schools within the Muskegon Area Intermediate School District boundaries. It provides the financial assistance necessary to obtain a two-year degree or its equivalent at an eligible partnering institution when used in conjunction with federal, state and institutional grants. Students must graduate with a cumulative unweighted 3.25 GPA or higher from a high school located within the boundaries of the MAISD. 
MICHIGAN ACHIEVEMENT SCHOLARSHIPS: Students will be eligible for more financial aid from the State:

- Up to \$2,750 if they attend a community college, per year
- Up to \$5,500 if they attend a public university, per year
- Up to \$4,000 if they attend a private college or university, per year

Students will be eligible if their family demonstrates financial need when they complete the <u>Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)</u>. High school seniors can get started by filing the <u>FAFSA</u> and by creating a <u>MiSSG Student Portal</u> account three to five business days after filing your FAFSA.

WOMEN'S DIVISION CHAMBER OF COMMERCE: A minimum of six \$1000 scholarships are available to all students planning to attend Muskegon Community College or Baker College full time. Applicants must have at least a 2.5 GPA and reside in Muskegon County. PLEASE NOTE: Applicants may be MALE or FEMALE. Applications are available in the Counseling Office or online at <a href="https://www.womensdivision.org">www.womensdivision.org</a> Deadline is March 11.

TUITION INCENTIVE PROGRAM (TIP): This is an incentive (and need based) program that encourages eligible students to complete high school by providing tuition assistance for the first two years of college and beyond. To meet the financial eligibility requirement, a student must have (or have had) Medicaid for at least two years between the age of nine and high school graduation. Counselors met with TIP eligible seniors to review this opportunity. chool safety and student interaction with law enforcement have always been a passion of mine. My first mentor was my D.A.R.E. officer (school resource officer). I learned from this personal experience that positive relationships between students and police officers form strong bonds and respect for one another, genuinely viewing police officers as a resource.

I was appointed Chief of Norton Shores Police Department on October 1, 2023. Before my appointment, I served the Norton Shores Police Department for nineteen years in various roles within the department (patrol officer, field training officer, corporal, patrol sergeant, detective sergeant, and patrol lieutenant) and community (Michigan Irish Music Festival, Ginka Memorial, and Child Abuse Council). I hold a Bachelor's degree in Criminal Justice and have three classes left in my Master's in Public Administration from

Grand Valley State University. (GO LAKERS!) In addition to my education, I attend many law enforcement trainings, specifically in the area of active assailant response and tactical officer operations.

As a parent of a Lincoln Park fifth grader, ensuring safety in our classrooms and events is one of my top priorities. While our Sailor community takes advantage of much needed time off, our team is afforded the opportunity to train on active assailant drills using the empty buildings whenever possible. This county-wide practice ensures we know precisely how to respond in each building uniquely, helping all of us sleep better at night knowing we have a plan.

The best offense in public safety is a good defense. The Norton Shores Police Department employs two full-time school resource officers who assist at the Mona Shores High and Middle Schools. These officers are assigned to various tasks but focus on mentorship. School resource officers work hand-in-hand with school administration to find creative solutions and promote positive behavior. The award-winning "RIDE with PRIDE" program is a key element in promoting positive behavior that all started right here in our district. It is an honor to have started this program at

Mona Shores School District over a decade ago. Due to its effectiveness, the program has expanded to nine other school districts in Muskegon and Oceana counties.

Since Mona Shores School District has added cameras to the buses, we have seen an increase in bus violation reporting. The two added traffic officers in 2022 have helped enforce the bus safety violations and ensure the community is following the school bus laws.

The entire staff at Norton Shores Police Department is proud to provide an accredited police department to our community that is constantly working to improve our services to our citizens. I am honored to have a forward-thinking staff that is always up to the challenge.





## **Tips for Improving Handwriting**

In this issue of the Lighthouse View, our Occupational and Physical Therapists share tips to help students develop good handwriting habits. Before children can be expected to print letters and words, they must build foundational skills like core strength, fine motor control, and eye-hand coordination. For young, preschool age children, it is best to focus on activities that will develop foundational skills, such as gross motor play, playing with playdough, stringing beads, and creative coloring and painting. Skills that contribute to successful handwriting are learned over time, beginning at preschool age through the upper elementary grades. Learning prewriting shapes like circles, squares, horizontal and vertical lines, is a great place to start. School age children continue their handwriting development by moving on to use prewriting shapes to draw-a-person skills, then uppercase letters, and finally lowercase letters. Other handwriting skills such as proper size and placement of letters on lines continue to develop over time, and some children need more time and practice than others.

### Two Mona Shores Professionals Honored by Grand Valley State University in 2023

Our staff are highly regarded in their fields, which brings many graduate students to Mona Shores for their practicums and or internships. One of our School Psychologists, Laurelin Barkel, NCSP, MS, CAGS, was awarded the School Psychologist of the Year from Grand Valley's Student Affiliates of School Psychology Club in Spring of 2023. The award goes to the nominee who best represents the leadership and support provided to GVSU School Psychology students. Mrs. Barkel has consistently supervised and educated school psychology interns and practicum students while at Mona Shores. During the current, 2023-2024 school year, Mrs. Barkel is supporting four graduate students from GVSU and MSU.

This fall, one of our Occupational Therapists, Jessica Kever, MS, OTR-L, received the 2023 Outstanding Preceptor Award for her efforts in supporting Grand Valley State University students in the field of Occupational Therapy. Mrs. Kever was nominated for this award by GVSU faculty and students. Mrs. Kever has been a field supervisor for many graduate students in the field of Occupational Therapy and has been an instructor at GVSU.

Over the years, our district has welcomed students in the fields of psychology, occupational therapy, physical therapy, speech and language pathology, in addition to student teachers. This school year alone, we have five graduate students placed at Mona Shores who are completing their studies in school psychology and physical therapy.




# **Magic C Letters**





- DELAYS postpone start time by two (2) hours and therefore, cancel morning ECSE, Tuition Preschool, and Head Start classes. With delayed start, childcare latchkey sites open at regular times in their regular locations.
- CLOSINGS typically cancel all school activities for the day;

including Tuition Preschool, Head Start, GSRP and latchkey program sites. With a school closing, the Childcare Center at Ross Park Elementary is open during regular hours for students currently enrolled in childcare/latchkey from any building. Contact your school building for information regarding evening activities.

To quickly notify families, Mona Shores utilizes the District Notification System. Parents and staff will be contacted via telephone/email/opt-in text with a message for school closings or delays.
