# Curriculum, Instruction, Assessment - Oh My!

Student learning is our priority at MPS. Students learn when teachers have the tools, the training and the student data to instruct students effectively, every day. Therefore, the alignment of curriculum, instruction and assessment is an essential key to student success.

Consider these three essential elements as a three-legged stool. When all are working properly, they can hold almost any weight. When one or two of the legs fails, the entire stool will fail. It is critical to pay attention to all three aspects to ensure the weight of student success is possible for every student.

**Curriculum** is the written and understood set of outcomes for learning. This is typically a school subject or course within a semester or school year. The curriculum includes the knowledge and skills the student is expected to demonstrate and acquire.

**Instruction** is the activity that actually happens in the classroom (or at home, or the community or the college classroom or the workplace.) Instruction includes all of the stakeholders that work together with the student and help the student acquire the expected knowledge and skills.

**Assessment** is the formal process that the teacher takes to determine how the student is progressing toward the learning outcomes or the process the teacher takes to determine how the student met the outcomes at the end of the learning process. Assessment can be informal, which may or may not be graded, with the purpose of feedback for learning continuation. Assessment can also be formal with grades for the purposes of a report card or transcript.

The distinction between *Curriculum, Instruction and Assessment* is important to note for parents and community members because these are often the unseen or "unshiny" parts of learning. While the new windows, new computers or new football fields are beautiful, new curriculum, training for updated instructional techniques and assessment programming are also a top priority at MPS for student learning.

### Did you know...CURRICULUM MATTERS?

- A Good Curriculum Plays an Important Role in Shaping and Reflecting
  Culture. Children need to see themselves in books, articles, story problems,
  careers, etc. When they do not see others who look like them in the curriculum,
  they do not believe they can be ANYTHING they want to be.
- A Good Curriculum Benefits Students by Establishing Internal Consistency. Whether a student is in Mr. Smith's classroom or Mrs. Parker's classroom, the classrooms are held to the same standards and the same learning outcomes. This consistency is critical for students to be prepared for the next level of learning. Good curriculum and accountability enable this standard of learning.



- A Good Curriculum Creates Measurable Benchmarks and Learning Outcomes. Without measurable learning outcomes, the learning system cannot function properly.
- A Good Curriculum Encourages Collaboration. In today's world, one must learn to work with others. The ability to talk with others, problem solve together, respectfully disagree and create together is the way of the future.


Supporting ALL Students using a Multi-tiered System of Support

A Multi-Tiered System of Support (MTSS) is an educational framework that provides a comprehensive and systematic approach to addressing the diverse needs of students in schools. It is often used to support academic and non-academic (behavior, social emotional, attendance) success, and it can be applied at various levels, including for individual students, classrooms, and

entire schools. This comprehensive approach aims to provide timely and tailored interventions to ensure every student has the opportunity to be successful.

When addressing the diverse needs of students, supports are categorized into different tiers, forming the 'multi-tiered' aspect of the MTSS framework. Tier 1, known as Universal Support, ensures the delivery of high-quality, evidence-based instruction to all students. MPS utilizes an evidence-based curriculum and instructional strategies. Positive Behavior Interventions and Support (PBIS) is used school-wide, and social/emotional learning is taught to all students. Tier 2 targets students who need additional assistance through small group interventions and targeted strategies, this often happens in the classroom. The most intensive level of support is found in Tier 3, reserved for students facing significant challenges. Support at this level is more individualized and based on specific skills needed by each student. Additionally, MPS students may receive tier 3 support from an interventionist or be invited to attend extended day services provided by the teaching staff.





A Multi-Tiered System of Support (MTSS) is an educational framework that provides a comprehensive and systematic approach to addressing the diverse needs of students in schools. It is often used to support academic and non-academic (behavior, social emotional, attendance) success, and it can be applied at various levels, including for individual students, classrooms, and entire schools. This comprehensive approach aims to provide timely and tailored interventions to ensure every student has the opportunity to be successful.

This year MPS has hired a district MTSS coordinator to guide and support this work across the district. To guide this initiative, three key principles, integral to the success of MTSS are relied upon:

- 1) identify and implement strategies and interventions that are based on research and have proven effectiveness.
- 2) regularly collect and analyze data to identify students' needs in order to adjust instruction and interventions accordingly.
- 3) encourage collaboration among educators, administrators, and support staff to ensure a cohesive and coordinated approach to student support.

The goal of MPS, as it pertains to MTSS, is to ensure that all students receive the support they need to excel by employing a comprehensive and proactive approach to academics, behavior, social emotional learning and attendance.. This involves focusing on effective strategies and interventions, fostering collaboration, and utilizing data-driven decision-making to support improved educational outcomes for all students.

























# Fun While Learning - Passion Professional Development (PD) for MPS Staff

We believe and invest in teacher professional development learning at Muskegon Public Schools. On our Early Release Wednesdays, teachers spend time in the afternoons collaborating with peers and training on various topics to enhance student learning.

There are three days during the 2023-2024 school year when teachers spend a full day together in professional development and the students do not have school. For this school year, those days are 8/23/23, 11/7/23 and 2/21/24.

We have dynamic teachers at MPS who have interests outside the classroom. At our 11/7/23 professional development, staff worked with their teams and subject areas for training for five hours of the day, and the last sixth hour of the day was open for teachers to lead a session where they shared their hobbies/passions with other staff and taught them something new. Nineteen teachers stepped up to lead these "Passion PD" sessions allowing for a great variety of topics for staff to choose from in their last hour of their full day of district learning.

Offerings in this "Passion PD" hour included fitness-related courses such as Cardio Drumming and Teacher Survivor Challenge (modeled after the Survivor reality TV show.) Staff could also choose to learn how to play Bridge, gain tips for competing in a jigsaw puzzle challenge, and work with textiles as teachers taught them how to crochet, knit and make yarn. Our newly outfitted E-Sports lab was at capacity with people experiencing this exciting option for students, and there were no empty seats in our Mac Lab with staff learning how to take great iPhone photos.

One of our high school teachers wrote a book and presented on that, another teacher led a session on how to polish Petoskey stones, and another teacher and her daughter demonstrated how



to use woven wraps to carry a small child. Other sessions were offered on service dog handling, how to forage in the forest for food, water color sampling, running, cupcake decorating, Zentangle meditative drawing and more.

Enjoy these photos of our teachers and staff having fun while learning something new, and sharing about their passions outside of the classroom.

# Winter 2024 Literacy Update

Muskegon Public Schools has been busy piloting new language arts programs this fall and implementing systemic changes in the elementary buildings to close instructional gaps in literacy. Both of the pilot programs for first through fifth grades are "knowledge-building" curricula which build students' background knowledge through reading high-interest text and vocabulary instruction. This knowledge-building enhances their skills across other content areas including math, science, and social studies.

Twenty teachers piloted either the Bookworms or EL Education program. Pilot teachers experienced four days of training in August and then follow-up training from OpenUp Resources with teachers experienced in using the programs. Our teachers also participated in professional development through a learning lab in local classrooms that have the program well-established. Both pilot programs have built in intervention time where teachers can target specific skills that students need either remediation in or extension. Comments from both teachers and students regarding the interest of the texts, the level of reading, and level of engagement are very positive for both programs. Decision making will begin after our January reading benchmark data is collected. A recommendation to the board will be made in early spring to ensure adequate time for training and materials purchasing so students can begin learning using the new resource in the fall of 2024.

In addition to the two reading pilot programs, changes have been made to interventions at the elementary level. Each elementary building now has two intervention blocks built into the daily schedule to provide remediation or extension for students in both reading and math. This provides consistent times for intervention or IEP services and minimizes student pull-outs during core instruction. The intervention that is currently being used by classroom teachers in first through fifth grade to meet student skill needs in phonics was designed by Sharon Walpole, a leading reading researcher. The intervention takes 15 minutes and involves direct instruction on specific phonics skills. Student progress is monitored frequently in order to close the gap in reading.

With the addition of a new knowledge-building curriculum, established daily interventions, and progress monitoring, we are expecting great gains in our elementary students in reading, writing, and background knowledge.







### TOP MYTHS SURROUNDING HOMELESSNESS

**Myth # 1:** Individuals experiencing homelessness are lazy and simply need employment

**Fact:** Everything is more difficult when homeless. Imagine struggling to be interview ready with wrinkled clothes out of a bag, no shower, creating a resume without a computer, constant worry and inconsistent sleep. Despite this many people experiencing homelessness are employed. Unfortunately, the jobs they hold are often low paying or part time which does not allow them to cover the rising cost of housing. Bad credit scores and rental history often disqualify people for housing as well.

**Myth #2:** Homelessness is primarily visible on the streets

**Fact:** Only 1 out of 10 people experiencing homelessness are unsheltered. Almost 80% of people choose to stay with a friend or relative to avoid shelters or sleeping on the street. Many shelters have limitations and requirements which can make shelter stays complicated or separate families. Those who stay with friends are often in overcrowded and strenuous situations. This is why McKinney Vento counts students who are doubled up due to economic hardships, evictions, etc.

**Myth #3**: Assistance is readily available for those experiencing homelessness

**Fact:** Most local services for the unhoused focus on emergency services to meet immediate needs for a brief period. These services are not equipped to provide permanent housing solutions. It is difficult to find affordable housing in Muskegon. Even those with a housing choice voucher from HUD often wait several months to find housing. Housing First programs in Muskegon are not able to meet local demand.

Myth #4: "It can't happen to me"

Fact: It is a common misconception that "poor choices" cause homelessness when in reality many factors result in homelessness. Fires, floods, long term illness, addiction, death, medical expenses, natural disasters, job loss, and domestic

violence to name a few; even having only one wage earner in the household can put you at risk of experiencing homelessness. If any of the situations could potentially apply to you it is important to recognize it could happen to you too.



### K-12 MATHEMATICS DEPARTMENT

Muskegon Public school elementary students have the opportunity to play games to master foundational math skills such as counting sequences, making tens, comparing numbers, adding to 10, adding to 20, finding factors, patterns and other important mathematical concepts...Further, they afford opportunities for students to deepen their mathematical understanding and reasoning. ### **BUILDING THINKING CLASSROOMS**

Muskegon Public Schools teachers K-12 are working intentionally to provide opportunities for students to think and make meaning of their understanding of mathematical concepts. Members of the District Mathematics Leadership team are studying the book Building Thinking Classrooms in Mathematics Grades K-12 written by Peter Liljedahl. The 20 members of the team gather monthly to study several of the 14 Teaching Practices For Enhancing Learning that are presented in Lijedahl's book. These practices are studied while the participants engage in rich mathematical tasks. These tasks allow teachers to analyze practices to take back to their classrooms to use with their students. The ultimate goal is for students to communicate their understanding of math so they can be successful in applying mathematical concepts and make connections as they move through the K-12 curriculum. One of the strategies that math staff are using to increase student engagement is to have students work in teams at white boards posted around the room to find and record solutions to assigned tasks. This strategy can be used in an elementary, middle or high school classroom. Students are engaged and excited to learn!

### 2024 Winter Science Update

Welcome to 2024! Hard to believe our school year here at MPS is already halfway over. As we begin a new year, I wanted to take a moment to reflect on the first half of our school year.

This fall, three 4th and 5th grade classrooms at Bunker Elementary were able to take a field trip aboard the W.G. Jackon research vessel and work with scientists from Grand Valley State University to study the water quality on Muskegon Lake and Lake Michigan. They tested the water and studied the clearness (turbidity) of the water, the PH levels, plankton levels and the water's conductivity. They learned some Muskegon Lake history and about the lake's invasive species. The kids loved the experience. The rest of the 4th and 5th grade classes at Bunker will experience the same trip in the spring. Our long-term plan is to provide experiences like this to Oakview and Marquette students in the future. We are grateful to Grand Valley State University for hosting these learning experiences and also for funding our field trip transportation.

The Muskegon Middle School science department is wrapping up a pilot curriculum called Cereal City Science. If this sounds familiar, it's because that is the same company that provides our elementary science curriculum. Sixth, seventh, and eighth grade students were able to complete a physical

You may have heard Scout's name from your scholar so I wanted to introduce him here. He's done amazing work with our students!

# You can create a mini volcano at home with your child by following the directions below:

### **Materials:**

- An adult helper
- Water
- Plastic cup
- 3-4 tablespoons of baking soda (or more!)
- 1 teaspoon of dish soap
- Food coloring (or washable paint if you want to avoid staining)
- 1 cup (8 oz.) of vinegar

#### **Procedure:**

- 1. Combine your base ingredients by putting the water inside of the plastic cup and filling it about 2/3 full.
- 2. Add the baking soda, dish soap, and a little bit of food coloring or washable paint. Using washable paint instead of food coloring will help you avoid staining.
- 3. Stir the ingredients together.
- Food coloring (or washable paint if you want to 4. Pour in the vinegar until it starts foaming and pouring out of the cup.
  - 5. Repeat as necessary with more colors. Your kids will definitely be asking for more.

### What's Happening in the Mini Volcano Activity:

The "lava" bubbles that erupt are filled with carbon dioxide. Carbon dioxide is a gas that forms when an acid (the vinegar) reacts with a base (the baking soda.)

According to the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association, Speech Pathologists work to prevent, assess, diagnose, and treat speech, language, social communication, cognitive-communication, and swallowing disorders in children and adults. Muskegon Public Schools employs eight hard working professionals: Matthew Beld, Amy Donaldson, Leah Gantjos, Jordan Grinnell, Lindsay Jones, Cindy Kauffman, Veda Rooks, and Lisa VanderWeit.

As speech therapists, "it is our duty and our privilege to help give a voice to those without one. One of the most rewarding experiences of our job is seeing students becoming more clear and confident in their communication as they work with us." Their belief is that each and every student, regardless of abilities, should have equal access to communication - everyone has something to say and deserves to be heard! According to Jordan Grinell, "to watch a student become confident in their own voice is absolutely priceless. Seeing that same student make progress with their communication throughout the years is, indubitably, one of the most fulfilling aspects of this job." From articulation to Augmentative and Alternative Communication, the scope of practice is incredibly broad for this profession...it sure keeps things interesting! There is never a dull day working as an SLP at MPS, which is what brings them coming back year after year. She notes that, "When your students come up and ask, "When can I come to speech again?", you know you're doing something right!"

Matt Beld notes that, "On any given day we may be helping students develop listening comprehension skills, refine their sounds, or expand their vocabulary, so our work always keeps us on our toes. One of the most bittersweet things about our job is watching our students grow in their skills to the point that they graduate from our services. They become a part of our lives, and while we are incredibly proud to see them move on, we miss them dearly once they have. ### **Required Documents:**

- Proof of residency: <u>MUST</u> provide a copy of your utility bill, assessment/property tax statement, rental/lease agreement (must include landlord's telephone and signature), no junk mail. *Must be removed from the envelope before providing the* proof.
- Parent/Guardian's Identification: Driver's license or passport
- Birth Certificate: An original certified/state issued birth certificate that can be viewed and copied by MPS
- Official Michigan Immunization Records: State law requires that your child's immunizations must be up-to-date or your child cannot enter school. Pick up a copy from your local health department or doctor's office.
- Custody/Guardianship court documents (if applicable)
- Copy of most current Special Education/IEP (if applicable)
- Transcripts and current grades from previous school for High School students

### REZONING OF THE FORMER NELSON SCHOOL

### WHAT IS REZONING?

Zoning is an essential act of city planning. It helps determine the function of a property in specific locations to provide a coordinated, well-planned city. Property may be zoned for commercial or industrial use or residential use. Sometimes zoning allows for a mixture of land uses like an apartment building with a retail store on the ground floor. When a city government or a property owner wishes to change the types of land uses allowed at a property, they need to go through the process of rezoning. The City of Muskegon rezoning process includes review by the Planning Commission and City

Commission at public meetings. Both meetings offer opportunities for input from the general public during a public hearing. Based on the information provided in the request, the Planning Commission makes a recommendation to either approve or deny the rezoning request to the City Commission, and the City Commission makes the final approval or denial.

General Capital, an affordable housing developer, requested that the former Nelson School building and surrounding property be rezoned to allow for multiple housing units so that they can redevelop the school into an apartment building. The City of Muskegon Planning Commission and the City Commission have both approved the rezoning request. The rezoning approval allows for the proposed 52-unit affordable apartment project to move forward.

Nelson School Previous Zoning: Form-Based Code, Urban Residential (FBC-UR) Nelson School Updated Zoning: Form-Based Code, Neighborhood Core (FBC-NC)

The developer is proposing a 52-unit workforce housing development that offers apartments to people earning between that will be a Low-Income Housing Tax Credit (LIHTC) through the Michigan State Housing Development Authority (MSHDA) for workforce housing. As of November, the City Planning Department is still awaiting their site plan to review. The Planning Department doesn't anticipate any issues with approving their building request as they are proposing to keep the exterior of the building the same. This development is helping to reach the goal outlined in the 2022 Housing Needs Assessment which outlines that the city needs an additional 3,000 housing units, at all price levels, over the next five years to keep up with demand.

According to Muskegon Public Schools (MPS) and the developer, the soccer fields will remain in use by MPS and the public.

Their Payment in Lieu of Taxes (PILOT) agreement was approved by the City Commission on October 24, 2023. The final step is to submit to MSHDA for approval in December and it is a competitive process. It is one of six LIHTC developments the City is pursuing from MSHDA for this round of funding.

If everything goes to plan residents can expect to see construction beginning in 2024 and units ready to move in by 2025. Learn more about the project on General Capital's website: www.generalcapitalgroup.com.





### Glenside... The Buses...

The school year is rolling along with the help of the Bus Associates at Glenside (and of course the bus drivers). This team wakes up early to arrive at Glenside at 6:30 a.m. to pick up the children at 6:45 a.m. The all-day program begins at 7:45 a.m.



The Bus Associates in the Preschool program(ages 3-5) play a BIG role. They are the first staff member the children see if they ride the bus. Each bus has two staff members to assist in the safety of the 28 children on board. The staff will greet the children and then assist them on the bus as the steps are big for some of the children. At this point of the year, the children hop into the car seat and buckle themselves. The Bus Associates check to make sure the seat is secure and the children are safe. The bus rolls on... While riding on the bus some of the children are talking to friends, singing a song, or catching up on sleep before arriving at school.

Each child has a picture ID with their name, and teacher name/ room number to assist in the lineup at the start and the end of the day. When the bus arrives at school the Bus Associates have the children line up along the fence with a safety friendship rope and walk to the gym. In the gym, the classroom staff greets the children as they line up for the day at Glenside. The staff supports each other to ensure the safety of the children. Attendance is taken using a Face-to-Name photo sheet. This helps staff confirm who is in attendance. It is also a nice check with their peers to see who is in school that day. They are learning the names of

their friends, and are working on counting skills as they count off how many friends are in the line.

The children and staff walk down the hall to their lockers, greeted again by classroom staff to start the day.

Meanwhile, the Bus Associates return to the bus to pick up more children for the half-day program. The half-day program has a morning and afternoon group. Needless to say, the buses are rolling. At the end of the day, the Bus Associates are the last staff members the children see until the next scheduled day of school. They play a big role in our program.

### What's New at the View?

The change in Oakview's daily schedule will not impact our families' schedule because the changes will not impact Oakview's start or dismissal times. Why is this such a big deal for our students? Currently, each classroom teacher has time in their daily schedule for working with students in small groups. However, starting January 8, Oakview's small group time will be organized in a way that allows teachers and support staff to push-in and/ or pull-out students based on their academic needs. With almost a semester of student data available for our teachers to analyze and identify patterns, Oakview teachers will now be able to work with small groups of students and target their specific needs as an organized team of academic experts! Oakview's revised, small group time is in addition to Oakview's 'Extended Day,' which runs after school on Tuesdays and Thursdays. Another new addition for Oakview in the New Year is Michigan Reading Corps. The Michigan Reading Corps is a state-funded program designed to support students in grades Kindergarten through Third Grade specifically in the area of early literacy. We are excited to add Reading Corps to Oakview's menu of academic interventions.

Oakview also knows how to celebrate all the hard work that our staff and students are doing in the classroom! On the first Wednesday of every month, Oakview hosts our "Big Red All Star Luncheon" held to recognize each classroom's 'Students of the Month'. 


# September & October Students of the Month!

# Look at what Encore Classes Study at Marquette!

Greetings from Mr. Darga's technology class. The next 9 weeks we will be introducing coding to our students in the K-5th grade. # Immersive Dual Language Program @ MPS - Two-Way Immersion (TWI) for Grades K-5

Muskegon Public Schools offers a Two-Way Immersion (TWI) program at Bunker Elementary for grades K-5. Over 180 students are enrolled in these elementary classrooms where Spanish is the primary language spoken particularly in the lower grades. Currently, we have two TWI classrooms per grade for grades K-2 and one TWI classroom per grade for upper elementary.

Research shows that dual-language programs are beneficial for both English-language learners and native English speakers. One study offers strong evidence that dual language programs improve student literacy achievement for all learners involved.

To learn more about the TWI program, I observed a lower elementary classroom and an upper elementary classroom. Both classrooms were very welcoming and the students all engaged and learning. Here is a peek into my experience:

Ms. Angelica Herrera-Estrada's 5th Grade Classroom: The bookcase-lined hallway led me to an open classroom, with students sitting in pods of four at modular tabledesks, ready to learn. The social studies lesson started with a fast-paced, engaging CNN10 video that covered everything from US-China relations to nationwide milk shortages in cafeterias due to cardboard packaging scarcity to how tourism is negatively affecting the coastline of Mozambique to a gentleman in Iowa who has the largest collection of pencils in the world. A quick trivia question followed that evoked cheering from students who answered it correctly, and some anticipation to see if CNN 10 would give a shoutout to "Bunker Elementary" as one of the schools who tunes into the program.

Then "Dime - lo que está pasando en el mundo hoy? What is happening in the world today?" said Mrs. Herrera-Estrada. Instructions and next steps for the students were given in Español and English. The students answered aloud as they and their teacher recounted the current events they just learned about, weaving back and forth from Spanish to English. Next, "Dictado Time!" The teacher dictated a sentence in English while students wrote it, all having to do with the social studies lesson, and then they corrected grammar together in the sentence. Great engagement in the classroom, the subject moved quickly, and after three minutes of quiet work again, it was "Ok Chicos, dime!" time to answer aloud in class as the students focused on the Learning Target and engaged in the day's topic of European exploration.

### continued...TWO WAY LANGUAGE IMMERSION

Ms. Stephany Yack-Saavera's 1st Grade Classroom: The classroom's colorful alphabet carpet along with the foster grandparent who helps with reading literacy welcomed me into the classroom. Students were in "small group time," either reading with the foster grandparent, playing learning spelling games on their chromebooks, or working in groups with their teacher, who spoke solely in Spanish. "¿Listos?" she asked after she explained the rules to the Spanish sight word flashcard game in Spanish with her small group of six first graders. Nothing like a little friendly flashcard competition to get students excited to learn.

I spoke to one student, Oliver, and asked him what he liked best about his experience in the TWI classroom. "It's fun" he said. He speaks English at home, and I asked him if his parents could still help him understand his homework, to which he answered "Yes."

Next, Gabrielle waved at me so I sat next to her and asked her what it's like in this classroom.

She said "I like my teacher and I like learning. I like to learn how to read and have fun." About learning in a Spanish-speaking classroom, she said, "I think it's great because I'm kind of an expert at Spanish now. I don't speak it at home, but I do speak Spanish with the new girl who only speaks Spanish, so now we can be friends." She continued to tell me that "pizza" must be the same in English and Spanish because when the new girl talks about "pizza," that's the word she uses.

I asked Gabrielle if there was anything else I should know, and she said "I have very great friends and I learn a lot."

What impressed me the most from observing these two classrooms was the confidence at which the students weaved in and out of speaking and understanding Spanish and their engagement in learning.

"It has been an amazing and challenging journey working with the TWI program," said fifth grade MPS TWI classroom teacher Angelica Herrera. "I am very proud to be a 5th grade teacher and seeing the growth that my students make in English and Spanish."

In the Muskegon Public Schools TWI Program, all instruction in grades K-2 is presented in Spanish. Past grade 2, instruction given in the English language gradually increases and by Grade 5, the ratio of instruction increases to 50% English/Spanish.

According to a recent US News and World Report article, four primary reasons to consider dual-language immersion learning are:

- Biliteracy is good for your brain.
- Learning a language is easier for young children.
- English learners succeed while maintaining their native
- Students build strong social connections and cultural awareness.

"Providing students and families with a variety of programming opportunities is our goal at MPS," said Dr. Jennifer Hammond, Executive Director of Instruction, at Muskegon Public Schools. "The TWI program is a unique opportunity for Muskegon elementary students that many other students in our county, state or country do not have the ability to participate in. Learning another language is a lifelong gift. I love visiting the TWI classrooms because the students are engaged, laughing, collaborating and genuinely enjoy learning."

Parents of incoming Kindergarteners for the 2024-2025 school year who would like their new kindergartener to participate in the TWI program are encouraged to enroll their child in the Two-Way Immersion program at kindergarten enrollment. If your child is already enrolled in school and is interested in the TWI program, they must be in kindergarten or first grade and demonstrating appropriate grade-level achievement in their first language.
