Muskegon Public Schools Participates in MiPHY Survey: Assessing Student Needs and Promoting Health

This year, Muskegon Public Schools participated in the Michigan Profile for Healthy Youth (MiPHY) Survey, provided by the Michigan Department of Education. This survey helps local school districts assess student needs and develop education programs and strategies to reduce health risk behaviors. Many local agencies, including the Muskegon Area ISD, Muskegon County Public Health, and Drug Free Muskegon, have endorsed the survey. The MiPHY survey is administered to 7th, 9th, and 11th-grade students. It is voluntary, and responses are anonymous. Student responses help school and community organizations track information on health behaviors, and the results are crucial for program planning and securing grant funding to address student

needs. The survey covers topics such as substance abuse, violence, physical activity, nutrition, sexual behaviors, and emotional health. Its design allows for comparison with the national Youth Risk Behavior Survey.

At MPS we use MiPHY data to inform program and curricular needs. Most recently the data was used when making updates to the district sex education curriculum. At the county level, Alex Bodenberg, Health and Wellness Consultant from the Muskegon Area ISD, has shared that the data is use to guide the strategic planning and youth programming for Muskegon ALI, Knowsmoke, Muskegon Area Medication Disposal Program, Alliance for Marijuana Prevention Coalition (AMP), and Ride with Pride Coalition.

Alex has also highlighted a variety of ways MiPHY results help the students, and inform the schools and community:

For Students:

- Tailored Support: The survey data enables targeted support programs for mental health, substance abuse prevention, and physical
- Resource Allocation: Results inform resource allocation within the school, ensuring students have the support they need to thrive.

For Schools:

- Informed Decision Making: Valuable data informs health and wellness policies, curriculum development, and evidence-based interventions.
- Program Evaluation: Survey results evaluate the effectiveness of health programs, leading to continuous improvement and comprehensive wellness strategies.
- Grant Funding: Data supports securing funding for health-related programs, expanding the capacity to address student health needs effectively.

For Community:

- Community Health Initiatives: Survey data informs community-wide health initiatives, promoting healthy behaviors and preventing risk factors, like substance abuse.
- Collaborative Interventions: Results facilitate collaboration between schools, local health agencies, and government entities to support youth health.
- Policy Development: Survey insights contribute to evidence-based policies and programs at the community level, addressing specific health needs of youth.
- Health Promotion: The community works together to promote health and wellness, creating a supportive environment for young people.
- Public Health Funding: Survey data supports grant applications for community-based health initiatives, benefiting the broader population.

MiPHY reports, along with other school-based data, help us to make decisions to improve prevention and health programming for our students. It provides meaningful data to the community agencies we partner with, allowing them to identify needed programs or services that reduce risk factors and increase protective factors enabling students to be successful in school. The data also is necessary to successfully apply for grants and develop programming to effectively address student needs.

Empowering Tomorrow's Workforce: Ford NGL Principles in Action with Xello and Career Zones

CURRICULUM

Spring 2024 Literacy Update

Muskegon Public Schools' Elementary buildings have been busy implementing changes since returning to school in January. With the addition of daily reading and math intervention blocks in first through fifth grade, we have also added four more interventionists.





Our six interventionists are all retired elementary teachers who are excited to work with students in need of additional instruction. During the reading intervention block, classroom teachers provide individualized phonics instruction in small groups and the interventionists use specialized programs to target small groups

of students in need of support. With this new system in place, we are ensuring that students are receiving the individualized literacy instruction they need to close the achievement gap.

In addition to the intervention block schedule in January, grade level teachers began meeting every six weeks to review student progress. Teachers meet with the principal,



MTSS Coordinator, Alecia Hoppa, the building instructional coach, and District Literacy Coordinator, Karen Abraham to monitor student progress in phonics and oral reading fluency. As a team, we reflect on the data, celebrate student growth, and make adjustments to the small groups as needed.

We are excited about the student growth in reading that we are seeing and also in our Muskegon MTSS system. To help communicate information to teachers, a MTSS News & Updates newsletter is published after each round of data meetings. Our newsletter motto is "We're not just building an MTSS system, we're building an achievement dream."

Embracing AI in Education

Understanding the world we live in and the career pathways that students will have the opportunity to experience has been a focus in the Office of Instructional Services. One piece of the puzzle is using artificial intelligence to support our students' education.

Because our district has decided to embrace the use of AI, we felt that it was necessary to first expose our staff to what AI can do for them and how they can use it with their students in the classroom. On February 21st, the staff at Muskegon Public Schools participated in an all-day training that included five different artificial intelligence topics.



Staff chose from different topics including: Preparing Students for a Future with AI, What Can AI Do for You & Ethical Considerations for AI in the Classroom. These sessions were presented to staff by our partners at Michigan Virtual.

At the end of the day, staff seemed energized about trying some new AI tools that could help reduce workload. Teachers had a better understanding of how to introduce these tools to students in a way that made students use deeper-level thinking skills.

As Muskegon Public Schools educates students in a world where we are just seeing the beginning of artificial intelligence integration, this initial training session marks the beginning of an educational transformation.



K-12 MATHEMATICS DEPARTMENT

Fact Fluency Development

Do you know that you can help your student learn math facts by playing games? Research shows that classroom math games in addition to a family math component had a significant effect on children's math learning. Children who played the games at home and at school, had higher math scores. The more math games children played, the higher their math scores. (Young, Reed, et al., 2023)

All you need is a deck of cards! One of the Essential Standards of Mathematics is about making learning fun! Playing games is fun for all! Read below for instructions on how to turn the classic game of Go Fish into a game that develops Fact Fluency. If you need more ideas for playing games at home or need a deck of cards, talk to your student's teacher. Have a blast while learning math!



Go Fish - Make 10

Set Up: Pass out 5 cards to each player. The remaining cards are placed in the "pond" in the center of the table.

How to Play: The goal of the game is to make matches of two cards that total 10. If players have pairs of cards that total 10, put them down in front of them and replace those cards with cards from the "pond". Players take turns asking another player for a card that will go with a card in their hand to make 10. If you get a card that makes 10, put the pair of cards down in front of you then take one card from the pond. Your turn is over. If you do not get a card that makes 10, take a card from the "pond" after your partner says "Go Fish". Your turn is over. If the card you take from the pond makes 10 with a card in your hand, put the pair down and take another card.



Sentence Helpers:

- _____, do you have any 4's?
- and make 10.

Scoring: The game is over when there are no cards left in the pond. The winner is the player with the most groups of 10's. Players can count by tens for the final score.



Variations:

- Instead of Make 10 for Go Fish, use "Doubles and/or Near Doubles +1/-1. Players then state the sum, or the doubles fact +1/-1, and the sum. The winner has the most doubles +1/-1 set of cards.
- Add up all of the sums of cards for the highest score.
- Create an agreed-upon rule of using more than 2 cards to make the quantity targeted. Ex. a player lays down a 2, 3, and a 5 to make a ten.
- Change the language to "Make 100". For example, 4 tens added to 6 tens equals 100. 40 + 60 = 100. This is good for students who have played and are proficient with making 10 but can benefit from stringing the concept to a larger place value.

CURRICULUM

2024 Spring Science Update

Spring has sprung! The days are getting longer and warmer and flowers are beginning to bloom. Life is reemerging from the winter slumber and it's a great time to be a Big Red! With summer right around the corner, our 2023/24 school year is just about to wrap up. Here's what's happening around the district as it relates to science.

Muskegon Middle School science has selected Cereal City Science as its new curriculum and if that sounds familiar it's because that is the same company that provides our elementary science curriculum. Now, there will be a seamless transition from elementary science to middle school science which should translate into even more academic success! 6th, 7th, and 8th grade students have enjoyed many hands-on activities during the year so far in both physical and earth science.

Four 4th & 5th grade classrooms at Bunker Elementary are going to take a field trip aboard the W.G. Jackon research vessel in May and work with scientists from Grand Valley State University to study the water quality on Muskegon Lake and Lake Michigan. They will study the clearness (turbidity) of the water, the PH levels, plankton levels and conductivity to name a few tests. They will also learn a little history of Muskegon Lake as well as invasive species. Next year, this experience will be available to ALL 5th grade classrooms in the district!



Another exciting update from Muskegon Middle School is the first ever ESports team! The team meets for practice on Monday's after school and will have a total of five competition days or "Game Days" where they will compete to earn points for a Championship held some time in May 2024. In addition to the game playing, the team members also complete online lessons that are teaching them about different careers within the video gaming industry.

Water Cycle in a Bag

Here is a fun activity you can do at home with your child called Water Cycle in a Bag. You can create your own water cycle in a bag by following the directions below:

Materials:

- Zip lock bag
- permanent marker
- water
- blue food coloring
- clear tape



Procedure:

- 1. First, use a permanent marker to draw a sky on the upper half of your ziplock bag. Include clouds and the sun.
- 2.Next, fill a cup with water and add a few drops of blue food coloring. This will help the water be more visible to your kids. Mix it up until it's a striking blue color.
- 3. Then, pour the water into the bag and zip it tight so no water escapes.
- 4. Now, hang your bag up on a window that gets a lot of sunshine. Affix it with tape on the corner to ensure it doesn't fall.
- 5. In a couple of hours, you can check on your bag, and then check again in about a day. You will eventually start to see drops of water sticking to the side of the bag. Some will be in the "clouds" and other drops will be coming down like rain.

What's Happening:

The sun is heating up the water in the bag, which turns the water into a gaseous state in a process called evaporation. This happens in our atmosphere, too. Because the water is in a bag and has nowhere to go, it sticks to the sides of the bag, turning back into a liquid. This is called condensation. This experiment demonstrates the power of the sun to transform water into different states.

Social Studies: Learning Can Be Spectacular!

Even when it's cold outside, the students in Mrs. Lakos' and Mrs. Hekkema's classes are engaged in hands-on social studies learning inside. The BIG Lesson is a week filled with adventure at the Lakeshore Museum of Science and History. This 5-day study trip incorporates the museum's abundant resources, as well as the knowledgeable staff. Students learn key concepts through various experiences and activities as they work as "detectives of history," examining various artifacts from Michigan's past.

This year, third graders studied the growth of Michigan. At the Heritage Museum site, they made paper, log marks, and used a printing press. At the Lakeshore Museum, they were pioneers and immigrants, and in the STEM lab, they talked about foundries and made mold castings. The culminating project was beginning a business using Michigan's natural resources, finding the best location, and using push or pull factors to get workers.

CURRICULUM

Muskegon Big Reds are on a New and Exciting Journey with Ford Next Generation of Learning

Our plan begins with strong community partnerships. We have partnered with many strong Muskegon-area businesses, the Chamber of Commerce, area colleges and non-profit organizations to create a vision, a strong team and set the stage for college and career opportunities for our students. We have also included our parents, students, and staff in the process. In late February, approximately 80 people gathered to learn more about the *MPS/Ford NGL partnership and focus on supporting our graduates in preparing them for college and/or career readiness after high school graduation*.

As part of this event, we asked our MMS and MHS students to share what they needed to learn at their highest levels. Here is what our Big Reds told us:

Authenticity: They crave authenticity in their learning experiences. They want to engage with real-world problems and scenarios, where they can apply their knowledge and skills in meaningful ways.

Relationships: Building strong relationships within the learning environment is essential for students' social and emotional development. Positive relationships with peers and with teachers create a supportive atmosphere where students feel valued and motivated to learn.

Choice: Empowering students with choices in their learning allows them to take ownership of their education. When students have a say in what and how they learn, they are more likely to feel motivated and engaged.

Relevance: They are more likely to try harder when learning experiences are relevant to students' lives and interests. Educators can make learning more meaningful and engaging by connecting curriculum content to real-life experiences, cultural backgrounds, and current events.

Application: Students value opportunities to apply their learning in practical ways. Hands-on activities, projects, and real-world simulations allow them to see the relevance of their studies and develop valuable skills.

Additional Time: Recognizing that learning is a process that takes time, students appreciate opportunities for extended exploration and practice. Allowing for flexible schedules and allocating additional time promotes mastery and deeper learning experiences.

Learning Through Play: Play is not just for early childhood; it is a powerful tool for learning at all ages. Incorporating elements of play into the learning process promotes creativity, curiosity, and experimentation. Too often our students are afraid to take risks because of failure. They specifically asked to play more often to have fun and gain confidence.

Challenge: Students thrive when they are appropriately challenged in their learning. Challenges push students out of their comfort zones, encouraging growth and development. Educators can help students build resilience and perseverance by setting high expectations and providing support.

Patience: Learning is not always linear, and students understand the importance of patience in the learning process. Cultivating a culture of patience and understanding allows students to embrace mistakes as opportunities for growth. Encouraging a growth mindset fosters resilience and perseverance in the face of challenges.

Practice: Mastery comes through practice, and students recognize the value of repetition and refinement in their learning journey. Providing ample opportunities for practice and feedback allows students to consolidate their learning and build fluency in skills and concepts.

While this journey will likely take 3 to 5 years, some of these college and career experiences are already taking shape at Muskegon High School and Muskegon Middle School. The 9th and 10th grade Academies are operational or in progress. The Work-Based Learning program has been revamped and students are beginning to be placed in career-focused experiences. More students are taking college-bearing courses today than ever before at MHS! And this is only the beginning.

There are three ultimate outcomes of our MPS/Ford NGL partnership: (1) Improve Students' Outcomes (academic, economic and social) (2) Improve Workforce Outcomes (create a talent pipeline for Muskegon County) and (3) Improve Community Prosperity (citizens who can earn a living wage, purchase a home and support their families). MPS Enrollment

All MPS families enroll their student(s) online. Simply go to our website, www.muskegonpublicschools.org and select the enrollment link. All our buildings have computers available.

Make sure to answer all the questions and click SUBMIT. You must also do an application for each student you need to enroll by adding another student.

Once you have completed your enrollment and if you have not provided

all required documents, you will receive an email stating you have not completed the enrollment. You can simply reply to this email and provide the documents, or bring them to one of our buildings nearest you.

Make sure to check your emails for incomplete enrollment communications. You can log back in and check your enrollment and if it says, "finished", you will be receiving a call from your student(s) building(s) for a start date.

Required Documents:

- Proof of residency: <u>MUST</u> provide a copy of your utility bill, assessment/property tax statement, rental/lease agreement (must include landlord's telephone and signature), no junk mail. Must be removed from the envelope before providing the proof.
- Parent/Guardian's Identification: Driver's license or passport
- Birth Certificate: An original certified/state issued birth certificate that can be viewed and copied by MPS
- Official Michigan Immunization Records: State law requires that your child's immunizations must be up-to-date or your child cannot enter school. Pick up a copy from your local health department or doctor's office.
- Custody/Guardianship court documents (if applicable)
- Copy of most current Special Education/IEP (if applicable)
- Transcripts and current grades from previous school for High School students

DON'T FORGET TO VOTE MAY 7TH ON THE NON-HOMESTEADED TAX RENEWAL.

Ballot Language:

This proposal will allow the school district to continue to levy the statutory rate of not to exceed 18 mills on all property, except principal residence and other property exempted by law, required for the school district to receive its revenue per

pupil foundation allowance and renews millage that will expire with the 2024 tax levy.

Shall the currently authorized millage rate limitation of 19.3754 mills (\$19.3754 on each \$1,000 of taxable valuation) on the amount of taxes which may be assessed against all property, except principal residence and other property exempted by law, in the Public Schools of the City of Muskegon, Muskegon County, Michigan, be renewed for a period of 6 years 2025 to 2030, inclusive, to provide funds for operating purposes; the estimate of the revenue the school district will collect if the millage is approved and 18 mills are levied in 2025 is approximately \$7,268,491.57 (this is a renewal of millage that will expire with the 2024 tax levy)?

What does "non-homestead" mean?

Non-homestead represents industrial, commercial, and some agricultural property and "second homes." It does **NOT** include a family's owned primary residence.

Is this a new tax?

No. This millage was last approved by the voters in 2017. If approved, the proposal would extend the existing 18 mills on non-homestead property through tax year 2030.

What if the millage is voted down?

The revenue generated from the 18 mills totals approximately \$6.6 million annually, approximately 10% of the school district's budget. If this millage does not pass, the State will not replace the funding and Muskegon Public Schools will be forced to reduce or cut programs to offset the loss.

Can the district use bond money to cover the loss?

No. Bond funds are restricted by law to Capital improvement and Capital acquisitions (construction, technology and equipment) and cannot be used for general fund expenditures.

Our Bowling team finished off another season under Coach Hichue with a First Team All-Conference bowler and a couple of bowlers who are deciding on which schools they would like to bowl at in college. Coach Loudermill led our Girl's Basketball team to an OK Green Championship and had three All-Conference performers on the squad.

Our Wrestling team led by Coach Ricks had 7 wrestlers place at the Conference meet, as well as, having three wrestlers qualify for Regionals. 

OHWS and CRAFT

focus on improving the physiologic and mental responses to the impact of flight. His research and academic interests focus on epidemiology, aerospace physiology, research design, physical and mental training, decision-making, and the physiologic and mental responses to the flight environment. He is a member of the Aerospace Medical Association, Society of Aerospace Physiology, as well as a contributing member to several NATO Human Factors Working Groups. He currently has numerous publications associated with research conducted on human performance optimization within the operational community.


