With the beginning of each new school year come many different experiences and opportunities for our students and families. This year is going to be a tremendous year for celebration across our district. Our seniors are the class of 2025, which is the 150th graduation class from Muskegon Public Schools. Our new Charles Hackley Middle School will open its doors for students on August 26. We will debut three renovated elementary schools, Bunker, Oakview, and Marquette. We are returning our early childhood programs to their local elementary schools. We also have moved our Two Way Immersion (TWI) program to its own building at Glenside Elementary, which will be under construction this year.

This is such an event-filled and joyous time for our district. The direct support, trust, and BIG RED Pride in our community have made all of this happen! The two bonds, technology fund, sinking fund, and nonhomesteaded tax have all been so generously and selflessly supported by all of you! Without you, we

would be lost. When I interviewed just over five years ago, I alluded to the district needing to re-establish itself as a core pillar in our community. The physical transformation of the district is well underway and could only be done in unity with our community.

What is not as obvious for everyone is the transformation that our district has undertaken in the educational mission to our students and to our community. We are entering into Phase 3 of our PK-12 transformation in partnership with *Ford Next Generation Learning* (Ford NGL fordngl.com). This entire school year is our master planning phase and getting the foundation established to begin implementation for Fall 2025. We are only the fourth district in Michigan to transform in this way because we need to remain the steadfast leaders and educators that our students need and deserve.

Our mission "In Muskegon Public Schools, we nurture productive thinkers who thrive in an ever-changing technological society" will only be realized when we construct our entire system around student voice and student choice. We have engaged our entire community in this transformation process including multiple non-profits and over 70 business partners in our local community. We must all share the same vision and the same goal to educate our students for their next experience past graduation. Our dedication is to create a district wherein EVERY graduate knows what they are doing on the Monday after graduation-not some, most or the majority...but EVERY graduate! We will accomplish this by ensuring that EVERY graduate is not just handed their diploma but something else as well. It could be certification for a trade, college credits, direct pathways to local business employment, various industry certifications, or anything else that the student wishes to pursue. We must become a stronger school district to play our role in creating a stronger community.

It is truly a great time to be a Big Red! BIG REDS build BRIDGES, and our first one is to unite our community, our businesses, our non-profits, our government entities, and all others together in the pursuit of our next generation's success.

SUMMER 2024 Literacy Update: Building an Achievement Dream



Muskegon Public Schools' Elementary staff spent the Early Release professional development days in May learning about the new literacy curriculum, Bookworms. Bookworms will

be implemented in all elementary classrooms in the fall. Staff are excited to begin teaching the program which provides Muskegon students with 45 minutes of shared reading each day, 45 minutes of English Language Arts instruction each day, and 45 minutes of differentiated instruction each day. The differentiated instruction block fits perfectly in our new MTSS system and makes scheduling our interventionists for additional student support seamless. Additional reading instruction will be provided to students beginning the first week of school.

In addition to the May professional development, elementary staff will receive two full days of Bookworms professional development in August before school starts and ongoing training throughout the year. Staff will receive their books and materials prior to school starting so they are ready to start reading and writing instruction when school begins. Bookworms includes so many books at each grade level that by the time students leave 5th grade, they will have studied 283 books in the Bookworms program. Check out the photos of the Bookworms materials and books!

This spring our intervention team met and planned for the next school after reviewing reading data and giving feedback on the systems in place that we need to adjust or change. We began with celebrations and recorded the following statements: "All I've



seen is success! I get goosebumps every week."; "I love my kids wanting to come and not wanting to leave the group!"; "I enjoyed seeing the growth."; "I've seen growth since I started in March. I can't wait to see what happens in a full year." We are just as excited as the interventionists about the progress we are making and anticipate great reading gains next year.

Mathematics Updates for the 2024-25 School year

All teachers at Bunker, Marquette and Oakview Elementary will be piloting two math curriculums to support instruction and learning in the math classrooms this year. They will follow this schedule.

• August 22 - October 25 Illustrative Mathematics (IM) • October 25 - January 25 Bridges Mathematics

Both of these curriculums provide opportunities for students to experience a math classroom that fosters the values of the Essential Instructional Practices in Early Mathematics: Prekindergarten to Grade 5.

Values

- 1. We value children seeing themselves as mathematics knowers, doers, and contributors to the field of mathematics.
- 2. We value children's differences with respect to age, race, ethnicity, gender, socio-economic status, and geographic context (e.g., urban, rural, suburban).
- 3. We value mathematics as a broad, creative, and collaborative discipline for sense making and problem solving.
- 4. We value learning mathematics in a variety of ways both socially and cognitively.
- 5. We value mathematics teaching that focuses on connection, care, and authentic relationships.

These values seek to promote high-quality, equitable teaching and learning for young children in the discipline of mathematics. Hopefully, your students will come home excited about math and be curious to learn more. The goal is for all students to know that they are mathematicians!

Middle school students will continue to develop their mathematical thinking in a variety of ways this year at the new Charles Hackley Middle School location. There will be opportunities in the core math classroom, a math strategies classroom and during extended day learning. We encourage all students to take advantage of these opportunities and invite parents to acknowledge their hard work and dedication to be a better learner each day.

FAMILY SUPPORT NEEDED

Families play a crucial role in supporting math learning at home for students of all ages. Here are some effective ways families can do this:

- 1. Create a Positive Attitude Towards Math: Express positivity and enthusiasm about math. Avoid saying things like "I was never good at math" or "Math is hard."
- 2. Incorporate Math into Daily Activities: Look for opportunities to apply math in everyday situations, such as cooking (measuring ingredients), shopping (calculating costs and discounts), or gardening (measuring plots).
- 3. Play Math Games: Board games, card games, and online math games can make learning fun. Games like Sudoku, Yahtzee, or Monopoly involve math skills.
- 4. Read Math-related Books: Explore books that involve counting, shapes, patterns, or mathematical concepts suitable for your child's age. Discuss the math in the story.
- 5. Use Real-World Problem Solving: Encourage your child to solve real-world problems, such as figuring out how much money to save for a toy or how to evenly distribute snacks among friends.
- 6. Utilize Educational Apps and Websites: There are numerous apps and websites that offer interactive math activities and exercises tailored to different age groups.
- 7. Encourage Questions and Exploration: Support your child's curiosity about math by encouraging questions and providing opportunities for exploration.
- 8. Connect Math to Their Interests: Relate math concepts to your child's interests or hobbies. For example, if they enjoy sports, discuss statistics or measurements related to their favorite teams.
- 9. Provide Manipulatives and Tools: Use physical objects like blocks, coins, or measuring cups to help illustrate math concepts concretely.
- 10. Celebrate Effort and Progress: Focus on effort and progress rather than just correct answers. Praise perseverance and problem-solving strategies.
- 11. Engage in Math Together: Sit down and solve math problems together. Offer guidance when needed, but also allow your child to work through challenges independently.
- 12. Communicate with Teachers: Stay in touch with your child's math teacher to understand what they are learning in class and how you can support their learning at home.

By integrating these practices into daily routines and activities, families can create a supportive environment where children can develop strong math skills and confidence.

I look forward to the 2024-25 school year and anticipate that your students will experience a positive mathematics learning environment at school and at home.

August Science Update 2024

Summer is quickly drawing to an end and the new school year is nearly upon us. Lots of construction has happened around our entire district and we are so excited to return to our newly renovated elementary schools and brand new Charles Hackley Middle School!

With school nearing, I wanted to take a minute to update you on an exciting addition the district has made to our science curriculum for middle school. The Charles Hackley Middle School science department has selected a new curriculum! They have decided to adopt Cereal City Science as the new curriculum. This is significant because now the elementary and middle school will be using the same science curriculum so we are hoping for a seamless transition from elementary to middle school as far as science curriculum goes. Another exciting bit of science news is that we are bringing back the Grand Valley State University water research field trips. Every 5th grade classroom in the district will have an opportunity to experience the water research trip aboard the W. G. Jackson vessel. During this experience, the students study samples of water from Muskegon Lake and Lake Michigan and make comparisons, they learn about the history of Muskegon Lake, invasive species and more! This will be a whole new experience for many of our students and we are excited to be able to offer it again.

I also want to take this opportunity to share yet another exciting science activity you can do at home and make rainbow celery!



RAINBOW CELERY

Got some celery in the fridge? Then you can begin to learn about capillary action with a simple and colorful color-changing celery experiment. It's a really cool project that your kids are sure to remember for years to come!



What you need::

- Celery (with leaves for the best visual effect)
- Multiple glasses of water
- Food coloring in various colors

Here are the step-by-step instructions for how to make Rainbow Celery:

- 1. Set the Stage: Find a sunny spot in your home where your celery can bask in the sunlight. This will not only help in the experiment but also make for a lovely display.
- 2.Add Food Coloring: Fill each glass halfway with water and then add a few drops of different food coloring to each glass. For an extra touch of magic, arrange the colors in the order of a rainbow.
- 3. Prepare Your Celery: Cut the stalks of celery so that they fit comfortably in the glasses without tipping them over. Place each stalk into a glass of colored water.
- 4. Watch and Wait: This is where patience comes in. Let the celery stalks sit in the colored water overnight. It's a slow process, but by the next day, you'll start to see the leaves of the celery taking on the colors of the water they've been sitting in.

MPS Enrollment

All MPS families enroll their student(s) online. Simply go to our website, www.muskegonpublicschools.org and select the enrollment link. All our buildings have computers available.

Make sure to answer all the questions and click SUBMIT. You must also do an application for each student you need to enroll by adding another student.

Once you have completed your enrollment and if you have not provided

all required documents, you will receive an email stating you have not completed the enrollment. You can simply reply to this email and provide the documents, or bring them to one of our buildings nearest you.

Make sure to check your emails for incomplete enrollment communications. You can log back in and check your enrollment and if it says, "finished", you will be receiving a call from your student(s) building(s) for a start date.

Required Documents:

- Proof of residency: <u>MUST</u> provide a copy of your utility bill, assessment/property tax statement, rental/lease agreement (must include landlord's telephone and signature), no junk mail. *Must be removed from the envelope before providing the proof.*
- Parent/Guardian's Identification: Driver's license or passport
- Birth Certificate: An original certified/state issued birth certificate that can be viewed and copied by MPS
- Official Michigan Immunization Records: State law requires that your child's immunizations must be up-to-date or your child cannot enter school. Pick up a copy from your local health department or doctor's office.
- Custody/Guardianship court documents (if applicable)
- Copy of most current Special Education/IEP (if applicable)
- Transcripts and current grades from previous school for High School students

Treasures Abound in the MPS Music Library

The Music Library, unassumingly tucked away on the third floor at the Muskegon High School, holds treasures including published works of composers from every era of music from the 1600's to modern times. It includes most genres of music from symphonies to pop music and everything in between.

Two retired Muskegon Public Schools music teachers, Kathy Cron and Peggy Smith, returned to the district over the past year to organize and inventory this collection of music. They share that the library holds the following number of music scores, listed by performing ensemble:

- Concert Band 2,000 pieces
- Marching Band 1,700 pieces
- Jazz/Dance Band 900 pieces
- String Orchestra 1,000 pieces
- Concert Orchestra 1,200 pieces



In addition, there are hundreds of scores for choir, as well as various solo and ensemble sheet music editions for each specific instrument of the band and orchestra. To say that this music library is "huge" is an understatement! Most of the major composers' best works are in our library, and the library is so well-stocked that area schools, as well as the local professional Symphony, would regularly "borrow" scores.

The oldest original item in the music library is from 1888. One very unique treasure that is housed in the library is the original hand-printed music that was composed for and played by the Muskegon Marching Band in 1892 at the Hackley Library dedication ceremony. Since then, when the band would travel overseas, they would gift this music to other bands that they would encounter. It is noted that bands in Scotland and Ireland have this score as a gift from our marching band.

Other precious works in the library are original manuscripts from the famed MHS music director, William Stewart, who composed the beloved school songs, "Alma Mater" and the "Red & White" fight song. Stewart was the MPS Band Director from 1936 to 1959.

The bulk of the library's music was purchased from the 1950's on, but finding music in the library from 100 years ago is not uncommon, as Muskegon High School has had a reputation for its stellar performing groups since the early 1900s. The library has more than just published music; it also holds hundreds of reel-to-reel tape recordings of student concerts, going back to the 1950s as well as more recent CDs and videos of events.

The Muskegon Public Schools music teachers have certainly

enjoyed access to the finest music for their students to learn from, and to perform in their concerts, through the resources of this fabulous and unique library.

Chromebooks at MPS

Students at Muskegon Public Schools have outstanding opportunities to utilize the latest technology to assist in their learning.

Chromebooks are available for all students K-12, with every high school student provided with their own Chromebook that they are able take home every day. Students are expected to bring their device to school with them each day, charged and ready to go. A monitoring and filtering system is in place when the devices are off-campus, just as when the devices are being used in the halls and classrooms at MPS.


Muskegon Middle School also has a 1:1 device-to-student ratio, but the Chromebooks do not go home. At the elementary level, each classroom has a set of Chromebooks which stays with students all day.

The Chromebook should be seen as another classroom tool just as calculators, pencils, books, and paper have been viewed in the past. It is a student learning tool, not a method of entertainment. Each student is responsible for the well-being of the device issued to them and must meet certain expectations. In addition, a Chromebook case will be provided to protect the device that students are responsible for as well. Students are strongly encouraged to transport the Chromebook in a backpack between classes, and back and forth from home each day.

Fees will be issued for broken, damaged, lost and/or stolen devices, and the MPS Chromebook Acceptable Use Agreement must be signed by both student and parent/guardian before the device is provided.

New Buildings, Same Faces

Muskegon preschool programs have moved out of Glenside Early Childhood Center. We will now have classrooms at Bunker, Marquette, and Oakview.

Even though we will be in different buildings, it is the same program and staff! Our first day of school will be September 3, 2024.

At Bunker and Marquette will have full-day and half-day classes for Head Start. Children must be 3 years old by December 1, 2024, and income eligible to qualify.

The GSRP classrooms will be at Oakview for children who are 4 years old by December 1, 2024, and income-eligible. The Enrollment Office will be open at Marquette in mid-August.

Bussing will not be guaranteed for the 2024/25 school year.

It's not too late to sign up for preschool for 4-year-olds, but space is limited. For enrollment information please call 720-2540.

The following information: birth certificate, insurance card, shot record, 2023 W2, or taxes (preschool has income eligibility).

The pre-k program prepares young children for success socially, emotionally, physically, and intellectually by partnering with families. All Pre-K programs use the Creative Curriculum and comply data during the year to show the educational growth. The staff develops lesson plans to individualize the needs of the child. Research shows that quality early childhood interventions and teaching are critical to children's lifelong success.


